CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK.

The House committee on public lands today favorably reported Representative Tongue's bill creating the Crater Lake National Park. The bill was reported without amendment, the provision excluding prospectors, which was stricken out in the last Congress, being allowed to remain. The Secretary of the Interior said that in the case of Rainier Park, in Washington, prospecting was allowed, and as a result fires and other deprivations were committed and could not be restrained. As the 240 acres embraced in the park are not known to be mineral, this restriction should work no hardship. Mr. Tongue explained the bill to the committee, and a report is to be made by Representative Moody. Speaker Reed was the principal opponent to the bill in the last Congress, and with him out of the way, Mr. Tongue hopes to have the bill passed at an early date. —Oregonian, March 4.
