R. S. Moore, of this place, who has been visiting friends at Salem and Portland during the past month, will we are glad to hear, return this week.

Melvin Naylor, of Klamath, and A. Z. Sears, Manerva Naylor and Alta Naylor, of Medford, stopped at this place Tuesday on their way to Lakeview, where they are going to make final proof on timber claims.

The Del Norte Record says catching sturgeon and preparing them for market should pay at Klamath river. In the spring, hundreds of these fish can be caught in that stream. On the Columbia, in Oregon, much money is made in catching sturgeons.

From the hills and in fact from some of the valleys, one can see Mount Shasta on the south and Mount Pitt on the north. The tops of these two great land marks are always covered with snow. Mount Pitt is about 40 miles and Mount Shasta 80 miles away.

S. C. Hamaker and family, of Bonanza, were in town Tuesday on their way to Winthrop, Washington. Mr. Hamaker is going to that country on a tour of investigation and may engage in the mining business. How long they will be absent is uncertain, although it is hoped by their many friends that they will soon return to Klamath county.

The Medford Mail is informed that the forest rangers will probably assume their duties in the mountains earlier this season than last and anticipates that they will leave for the reserve about June 15th. More trouble is expected with fire than last year, as the snow has not fallen so deep in the high ranges this winter as it did a year ago, and consequently the timber will be more easily burned.

It rains easier in Yreka this winter than during any winter for a number of years past. The horizon may be clear of a single cloud, with the sun shining brightly, yet within an hour or two a lively downpour of rain may occur. While we have been favored with a satisfactory supply of rain all winter, the snowfall has not been very heavy, to make deep snowbanks on the mountain summits for late summer fountains, although much better than during the previous three or four winters. The ground will be well water soaked, even if the snowfall has been light, which will be of

great benefit in keeping the little streams from completely drying up during the hot summer days of July and August.—Yreka Journal.
