

Yesterday a Mrs. Martin was brought here by her husband and Mr. Cheney, of Lakeview, on their way to Salem. Mr. and Mrs. Martin reside at Spring Lake, about a hundred miles north of Lakeview. Mrs. Martin who has had poor health for several months, lately became insane, and it was deemed advisable to take her to the insane asylum at Salem for treatment.

Messrs. W. M. McIntire, F. C. Couch, E. E. McIntire, W. J. Woods, C. C. Beale and wife, Chas. I. Homes, T. R. Norris, T. G. Meyer, Edward Ferguson, J. C. Ferguson, Chas. H. Moore, J. F. Hendricks, Carrie A. Hendricks, all of Ashland, Wm. Terrill of Klamath Falls, Thomas Cline of Talent, and Mansfield Sonnichsen of Keno, were in town the first of the week on their way to the Lakeview land office to prove up on their timber claims.

In this high altitude and favored climate, meat of all kinds will keep longer without salting than in any other locality we were ever in. In lower altitudes it is difficult to preserve fresh beef untainted a week. Here, however, one may keep it fresh and excellent for three weeks at least. There is another thing about the beef in this country, viz: it is a hundred per cent. better than any that can be found in the east. One does not have to have his teeth sharpened and a pair of cast iron jaws to eat it after it is cooked. Hence, those who have all their lives been masticating tripe or bull's beef, can give their stomachs a rest when they get here.

An interesting incident is related in connection with the execution of Captain Jack, who was one of the Indians hanged in this county for taking a leading part in the Modoc war. The day before his death, Capt. Jack was visited by a member of the clergy and asked to receive the ordinance of baptism and otherwise prepare himself for a comfortable reception at the end of his journey on the morrow, being told of heaven's bliss and the means to attain it. Then Jack inquired of the divine if he were actually sure of the pleasures of heaven and the way to get there, to which an affirmative answer was given with positive assurance. Whereupon Jack replied: "As for me, I feel a trifle uncertain about the matter, and you being sure, I'll make this proposition to you: You take my place tomorrow and go to that region, about which you haven't a single doubt, and in return for the favor I'll give you all I've got—ten ponies—to add to your estate. I'm not usually very particular, but in this instance, feeling somewhat uneasy about the result, would a little rather stay here."

We continue to receive, as we have nearly every day for the past three months, letters from different localities in the east and west, making inquiries as to Klamath county and its resources and railroad prospects, and asking in relation to their particular lines of business, etc. To all these inquiries we endeavor to give as much information as we can, and stay with the truth that it is a splendid

country in which any business might be prosperous, and that no country on the continent has greater natural advantages and inducements. But we do not dare to urge people to immediately cut loose from their homes in the east or west and come here, but advise them to wait until the railroad becomes a certainty. The road is not yet a certainty, but will probably soon be one. Whether it is or not, we shall all soon know, and if the good fortune of a road strikes us, people from the east and elsewhere cannot come too soon. There will then be good openings in nearly every branch of business, and with energy and perseverance, any man of careful judgment and good sense can be successful.

CRATER LAKE PARK.

Congressman Tongue, of Oregon, says: "The people of Oregon are much interested in having a National Park established at Crater Lake. That locality is quite as wonderful and fully as interesting to scientists and tourists as the Yellowstone Park or the Yosemite. It is located in the Cascade Range of mountains, about 6,000 feet above sea level. The Crater Lake region is well situated for a park, but is unfit for any other purpose, as it contains no agricultural lands and is far above the limit of cereals. It is well timbered, but the timber is of no value for lumber. Its rocks are all fresh lava, and contain nothing whatever of value to the miner. Crater Lake is conceded to be one of the greatest scenic wonders in the United States, if not in the world. There are no settlers within the limits of the proposed park, which is easily accessible by roads already constructed. The lake is already regarded as a pleasure resort by Oregonians, but one of the drawbacks to tourists at present is the lack of facilities for entertainment there."
