George Hurn, an enterprising farmer of Klamath Agency, was in town Tuesday.

A small and unenthusiastic crowd greeted Candidate Bryant at Ashland last week.

Robert Garrett, the superintendent of the Ashland and Klamath Falls stage line, was in town Monday.

Hon. E. S. Moore will leave for Portland the last of the week to attend the state and congressional conventions.

Charles Sherman, who has a ranch near Dairy, returned on Tuesday from Rogue river valley where he has been all winter.

The entertainment given by the brass band Friday night was largely attended and a credit to those who participated in it.

There will be an afternoon tea at Mrs. Wm. Moore's on Saturday, April 7 from 2 until 5 o'clock. Refreshments served. Everybody invited.

Rev. Strange, of Ashland, who was here two or three weeks to fill the Presbyterian pulpit in place of Rev. Brown, left for home Monday evening.

Mr. Goeller's planing mill and manufactory opened on Monday for business, and his steam whistle now blows promptly morning, noon and evening.

Mrs. Russell Alford, who resides on the Ammerman ranch between this place and Keno, has been quite sick, but is now improving and probably out of danger.

Town taxes are being paid as rapidly as any one could reasonably expect. About \$740 was paid on town taxes during last month, and protest-warrants are paid up to August 8, 1899.

C. I. Roberts will leave for Portland this evening to meet his brother who lives at Colfax, Washington. From Portland he may go to Spokane and possibly will be absent all summer.

Good roads now allow Ashland stages to get through from that place to this point almost by daylight. It starts from Ashland at 6 in the morning and arrives in the evening about 8 or 9 o'clock.

Services next Sunday at the M. E. church. South. Pastor will preach on Friday evening at the Pine Grove school house on Sunday at 11 a. m. in Poe Valley at Griffith's school house, and at Kohn school house at 7 p. m.

Tough not a candidate, Judge Orr was endorsed by a big majority at the republican county convention to be the nominee for representative or state senator in case either can be secured for this county at the state elections.

The party of seventeen who went last week to Lakeview land office to press upon their timber claims, arrived here on their return on Monday evening, each bringing with him the title to 160 acres of choice timber land in Klamath county.

There was a change in the time of the departure of stages from Klamath Falls, commencing April 1st. Both stages for Ashland and Ager now leave here at 8 o'clock in the evening. Previously the stage for Ager left at 7 o'clock a. m. and the Ashland stage at 7 p. m.

Ashland Tidings: C. H. Finley, the Wisconsin timber man, returned from Klamath Falls, where he went a few days ago to investigate timber lands in Klamath county, and left Ashland yesterday morning for his home in Pittsville, Wis. He expects to return in June and bring with him a number of people to settle in Klamath.

Last Thursday being the 73rd birthday anniversary of Mrs. John Hunsaker of this place, her friends planned a surprise for her, which was a success in every particular. She was the recipient of several handsome presents. Delicious refreshments were served. A pleasant afternoon was spent, and at a late hour the guests departed wishing her many happy returns of the day.

The republican congressional convention for this district and the republican state convention will be held, the former at McMinnville on the 10th and the latter at Portland on the 12th. The delegates from this county, Messrs. E. S. Moore, Judge Arant, H. F. Murdock and W. F. Arant, are instructed for Hon. Thomas H. Tongue for congress. That he will be re-nominated on the

first or second ballot, there is not the slightest doubt.

The town board met Monday night and canvassed the town election of March 12 and decided that the following were elected, viz: W. W. Hazen, Otto Heidrick, S. E. Martin, J. G. Pierce, H. S. Schallack, trustees; J. W. Siemens, treasurer, and C. L. Parrish, recorder. The new board will probably meet next Monday evening for organization. Five hundred feet of rubber hose and ladders were ordered for the fire company in accordance with the petition of tax payers.

Died, at the Evauna house in this place on Sunday, April 1st, Asbury Anderson, aged about 60 years. The deceased came to Klamath county four years ago from Ashland, and has since resided on his farm near Spencer creek. He came to Klamath Falls to receive medical treatment about two weeks ago. The cause of his death was Bright's disease. He was a widower and leaves two daughters, both married, who live in the east. His funeral took place Monday, Rev. Strange officiating. Mr. Anderson was regarded as a worthy man and was respected and esteemed by those who knew him.

I. A. Duffy, one of our prominent and enterprising merchants, is making efforts to have a grand steamboat excursion on upper Klamath lake in May, for all. Everything will be done to make the trip enjoyable. The ride over the most romantic and beautiful lake in Oregon, together with the gorgeous scenery on the shores and islands and the view of the distant, snow-capped mountains all combined in the splendid music of the Klamath Falls brass band, cannot but make the excursion attractive and pleasant to all. OREGON TIMBER.

(Oregonian.)

S. R. Westworth, a prominent lumberman, of Duluth, Minn., who has been in Oregon for the past month, looking over the timber resources of the state, returned from Klamath county yesterday. He is much impressed with the magnitude of the timber belt lying along the line of the proposed railroad between Klamath, Cal., and Klamath Falls, Or., but considers it too remote from market for convenient shipping, as there are, he says, doubts about the railroad being built very soon.

"I had large quantities of timber for sale in Oregon," he said, at the St. Charles yesterday, "and much of it is offered at very reasonable prices; but purchases must be made slowly, as it takes time personally to inspect each quarter offered for sale, especially where the land is remote from railroads or navigable streams.

"There is a world of fine timber in Oregon, and quarter-sections carrying 8,000,000 feet are by no means uncommon. Just think of the timber on a whole township, each quarter section of which carries 8,000,000 feet. This would make 32,000,000 feet to the section, and 1,152,000,000 feet on a township. These figures are enough to stagger a man used to the sparse forests and smaller trees of the East.

"There will be a market for it all, however, as the timber of Michigan and Wisconsin is nearly all gone, and even now the cities of Duluth and Superior are being built largely of your Oregon fir."

Mr. Westworth thinks the extreme East must shortly look to the Pacific coast for its lumber, as the Atlantic forests have almost given out, as well as those of the Mississippi Valley states, and New York and Boston, which have been getting lumber by the lake route, will shortly be shipping Oregon lumber all the way by rail. The long haul of the heavy fir, he realizes, is a problem, but the increasing demand will find a way to overcome this.

"If we have the Nicaragua canal, the cities of the Atlantic seaboard would be our best customers, as lumber could be loaded on deep-water vessels right here in Portland, and the cost of transportation via the canal would not be great.

"I expect to see a large number of Eastern lumbermen interested in Oregon fir within a short time, and this condition will be followed by the erection of modern sawmills in many portions of the yet unbroken forest."

Mr. Westworth will remain out here for several weeks yet.

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REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

Last Saturday was the occasion of the republican county convention and consequently was a lively day for Klamath Falls. Delegates, candidates and others interested in the proceedings began arriving the day previous and by convention time on Saturday a big crowd had come together.

At 10 o'clock in the morning the convention was called to order by R. S. Moore, chairman of the central committee, and a temporary organization was effected by the election of Wm. A. Wright chairman and D. A. Presley secretary. Committees were appointed as follows: On credentials, Emmett, Brandon and Cerlings; on organization and order of business, Padgett, Wood and Wyatt; on platform, Davis, Brown and Langell. Then an adjournment was taken until 2 o'clock p. m.

On reassembling after dinner, the reading of reports was the first order of business. The committee on organization recommended that the temporary organization be made permanent, which was accordingly done. The committee on platform submitted the following, which was accepted:

To the republican convention of Klamath county, Oregon:

We, your committee on platform, beg to submit that we deem the adoption of a platform by this convention would be an encroachment upon the province of the state and national conventions and therefore unnecessary.

We submit for adoption by this convention the following resolutions:

First: Resolved, that we, the republicans of Klamath county in convention assembled, do most heartily endorse the present national administration.

Second: That we endorse the services rendered the state and nation in congress by our efficient representative, Hon. Thomas H. Tongue.
