Our time this week having been almost entirely devoted to the county candidates, and space being limited, we necessarily say little about the state, congressional and legislative nominees on the republican ticket.

Speaking of gerrymandering, here is a scrap of history: In 1874 the democratic legislature put Lake county (then including Klamath) in the same district with Wasco, nearly the same as it is now.

It is not necessary to speak of the balance of the county nominees on the republican ticket, as they are well known and efficient men.

C. L. PARRISH FOR CLERK.

The county clerk's office is second in importance to that of sheriff only. It is essentially the general business office of the county, and every one is interested in having it presided over by a man capable in every way to discharge its varied and manifold duties.

To his industry and ability in the last few years, acting as deputy assessor, Klamath county is indebted for a largely increased assessment roll.

Mr. Parrish's qualifications are absolutely perfect and people will make no mistake in securing his election.

SHERIFF KERSHNER.

In his two years of office, Sheriff Kershner, in the unpleasant business of collecting taxes, may have displeased a few, who we hope on reflection have seen that he could not do otherwise, being as he has been but the servant of the law and compelled to obey it.

FIGURES TALK FOR KERSHNER.

That the citizens of Klamath county made no mistake, two years ago, in electing Sheriff Kershner, is, as we have heretofore noted, not only been proved by his devoted attention to his office, but also by his successful and satisfactory collection of taxes, and especially back taxes, which he has done without favoritism on the one hand and without oppression on the other.

Here are official facts and figures, over which we ask voters to read and reflect:

He has collected and paid into the county treasury on the tax roll of 1894, \$520.02; tax roll of 1895, \$1,199.03; tax roll of 1896, \$3,150.35; tax roll of 1897, \$12,848.08; making a total of \$17,717.50; all of which should have been collected long ago.

In addition to the above, on said rolls he has advertised and sold property for delinquent taxes amounting to \$1511.03, making a total of \$19,228.53 collected and turned into the county treasurer's hands from those old tax rolls.

In addition to the labor of collecting those old taxes, he has collected and paid into the treasury from the rolls of 1898 and 1899, \$49,000. Grand total collection of taxes, old and new, during his two years, \$68,228.53.

The above is a record in tax collecting unsurpassed in this county, and one that every citizen may well feel proud of. It is of vital importance in order to pay off county indebtedness and reduce taxation, that the taxes levied should be collected promptly and closely, and that has been done by Sheriff Kershner to the best interests of all concerned.

Now after examining the above figures will you voters and tax payers, stop and consider a moment the facts disclosed by such figures. And in justice to your own best business interests, can you afford to turn off Sheriff Kershner and appoint another man? Can you afford to do it? Could you afford, in your private business, to discharge a valuable assistant and hire in his place another who could do no better and perhaps not so well.

No, you could not afford to do it and you would not. No man of good sense would be fool enough to take such a risk in his own private business, even to please any party or sect under the sun. Nor should he do it in equally as important business, viz: the business of the county.

The above collections of old taxes and the reduction of old indebtedness, \$19,000 in two years, is a strong reminder that whoever is elected sheriff, it will be well for the county and the tax payers, if he will follow in the footsteps of Sheriff Kershner. Thus will a continual reduction of the county's indebtedness take place, so that in a few years it will be wiped out entirely, principal and interest. And when the happy time comes, and it can be said that the county is entirely out of debt, it means that the rate of taxation will not be over one-half what it is now, and no longer will provision have to be made to pay the principal and interest of old indebtedness.

GARDNER FOR COMMISSIONER.

The fact that Mr. Gardner, for commissioner, will have a large majority in the precinct where he resides, is a recommendation which voters elsewhere in the county will do well to consider. A man who is loved and respected by his neighbors is always worthy of the confidence of the entire county.

VOTE FOR H. H. VANVALKENBURG FOR TRESASURER.

Mr. VanValkenburg is well known to everybody in the county. As treasurer he has been careful and exact, and his work for the county will bear the closest inspection. There is not the slightest flaw in his official business during his term of two years. This is needless to assert, for all voters in the county already know it to be true.

POLITICAL AND EDITORIAL HISTORY.

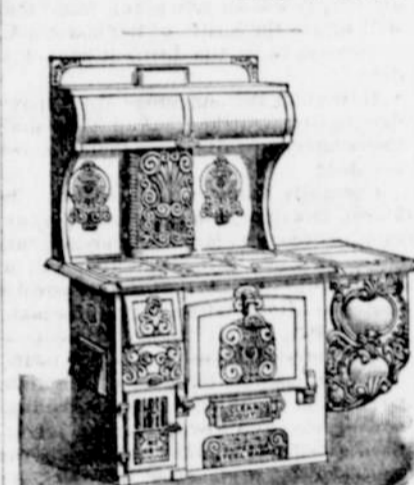
We have been furnished for publication the following account of political events which mainly occurred before we came here:
