The democratic presidential candidate Bryanized and monopolized the Kansas City convention, and is now attempting a similarly imperialistic course towards the whole country. He can't make the latter scheme work.

In view of the industrial and commercial prosperity, in view of the ready sale of every species of produce at good prices and the abundance of employment for all who want to work, no one will thoughtfully cast his vote for a change and run the risk of overturning and destroying present conditions.

The current report that leaders of New York democracy supported Bryan's nomination in order to shelve him after defeat and give room in the future for sounder aspirants is probably true. That is doubtless the only way they could effectually subdue his itch for an office beyond his statesmanship or reach.

Gov. Roosevelt drove the ice trust into submission in New York and as a consequence every trust in the country has reason to fear him. He has the backbone to carry out his convictions that all trusts should be squelched, and his influence and aggressive methods will be felt along that line in Washington.

It is reported that a wonderful change in politics is now taking place in Bryan's home state, Nebraska, and that there is a strong probability of its going republican by a good majority. Evidently, there are elsewhere, people are getting sick of hearing the everlasting whine about "calamity," when in fact there is no "calamity" to whine about.

All arrivals from the Philippines, though differing in politics generally, are unanimous in the declaration that the administration has pursued from the start the only practicable course in handling the islands. Their evidence, formed from experience and personal investigation, is worth infinitely more in swaying the judgment of the American voter than the incessant stream of calamity oratory flowing from the lips of democratic demagogues, who are prejudiced and refuse to accept or acknowledge facts.

Candidate Bryan is a warm biscuit. He was born with many exceptional gifts, among which were the voice and endurance of a masculine bovine. He has been precocious from earliest youth. At the age of eighteen months, he harangued a congregation of his fellow juveniles to proclaim and promote his theory that green apples were a sure preventative against colic and cholera infantum. In that early stage, as he flapped his little-toothless jaws together and poured forth his words, his mother, older heads in the crowd, and the poetic sense, the mental volcano, to which the development of subsequent years would give the power of increasing ebullition and discharge. Hence, to a small circle, it was not a surprise when he sprang to the apex of Ciceronian oratory.

"Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor," means, in brief, that an individual shall not crucify the truth. As near as we can learn, the command is still found, unamended, in the celestial statutes, though one might conclude from the present trend and practice of the world that it had been repealed entirely. Or perhaps it is believed something like this can be substituted: "Thou shalt not lie. But provided it is easier to lie than tell the truth, or provided there is some social or pecuniary gain in sight, then thou shalt lie with impunity. Under all other conditions, thou shalt stick to the truth." But if the original command hasn't been overhauled and changed, it is a plain, unequivocal order that no one can afford to kick aside with indifference, and every man, whether he be a shining gem in the realm of lore or a common plug, is amenable to it. In this connection, it may be said that Tophet, the receptacle of refractory souls who have refused to obey the decalogue or any part thereof, is just as warm and uncomfortable as it was when the

Gov. Roosevelt's speech-making itinerary is drawing big crowds and creating lively enthusiasm. Wherever he speaks, people throng to greet and hear him, and what he says is logical and acceptable.

In his speech at Corvallis last Saturday Binger Herman said: "Mr. Bryan says the Republican party 'puts the dollar before the man,' and we take him to mean what he says. The Republican Administration in the last four years has put more dollars before the man than he ever saw before, and the best part of it is that when we put that dollar before the man there is 100 cents in the dollar. One-fifth of the world's gold today is in the United States."

Richard Crocker, the leading democrat of New York, has published over his signature in the New York Journal, the leading democratic paper of that state, a letter strongly endorsing the policy of expansion, being diametrically opposed to the chief plank in the democratic national platform. The following extract gives his views in brief: "I believe in expansion; I believe in holding whatever possessions we have gained by annexation, purchase or war. This policy is not only patriotic, but it is the only safe one to pursue. Any other policy would show weakness on the part of the United States and invite foreign complications. This must be avoided, hence our policy must be vigorous. Every patriotic American, and every Democrat in particular, should favor expansion."

WHAT IS NEEDED.

What this town and county urgently needs, and what the Klamath Board of Trade can greatly assist in getting, are:

- 1 The arrival of the Oregon Midland Railway.
- 2 A great irrigating ditch from the upper Klamath lake, sufficient to irrigate 200,000 acres of rich land.
- 3 Large mills to utilize the great water power at Klamath Falls and especially to cut into lumber the 750,000 acres of sugar pine forests which are adjacent to Klamath lake and its tributary rivers.
- 4 A woolen factory to provide for the 1,500,000 pounds of wool which annually goes to distant markets from Lake and Klamath counties.
- 5 A paper mill to make into paper the inexhaustible supply of fir timber.

And there are many other things needed, but if merely the above five are obtained, the result will add 1000 per cent to the wealth, population and prosperity of Klamath county.
