A COLD RECEPTION.

The Oregon Press association met in Ashland last week and according to the Record of that place was treated by the local citizens with chilly indifference. The Record berates the town's selfish characteristics in caustic language. Perhaps anticipating liberal advertising abroad and subsequently adding to the influx of buyers from the east, Ashlandites met the National Editorial association over a year ago with bushels of fruits

and flowers and acres of bewitching smiles. An excellent banquet was spread, and it seemed to tickle the town all over to be given an opportunity to pour forth evidences of hospitality. Probably eastern editors concluded that it was a gigantic gush of feeling and welcoming sentiment naturally flowing from a source of unselfish and transcendent goodness. Hence, the town was widely advertised in glowing terms. This year the state association thought it would taste of Ashland's proverbial generosity, but the result was disappointment, according to the Record. That paper concludes its fiery arraignment with these words: "In the face of being the beneficiaries of all the kind remarks and appreciations so unstintingly showered upon this people by the National Editorial Association this community has allowed itself to lapse into such stagnation of swinish selfishness as to treat its benefactors—the Oregon Press Association which brought them here—in about as small and mean a manner as it is possible to do. Whether the town is so steeped in the cold-bloodedness of the chase after dimes, nickels and pennies as to be dead both to the appreciation of past favors or to a sense of shame in its usage of the state editors this week, we are unable to divine. That it will do the community no good in the estimation of all people possessed of good feeling and moved by decent impulses, there is hardly room to doubt."

BRYAN AS A PROPHET.

The Oregonian of the 22d inst., publishes the following extracts from Bryan's speeches in 1896 and 1900, showing how wisely prophetic his utterances are intended to be, but how grossly misleading they really are:

We have Bryan's word for it that—

"Today we are engaged in a controversy which will determine whether we are to have a republic in which the government derives its just powers from the consent of the governed, or an empire in which brute force is the only recognized source of power. When such an issue is raised there can only be two parties—the party, whatever the name may be, which believes in a republic, and a party, whatever its name, which believes in an empire."

But in 1896 we had his word for it that—

"If McKinley and the Republican party are successful and put in power for the next four years, wages will be decreased, hard times will come upon us, and over the land the price of wheat will go down and the price of gold will go up; mortgages on our

homes will be foreclosed by the money-lenders; shops and factories will close. We will export no goods, and we will import from foreign lands all the goods we use; thus will ruin, want and misery be with us."

Does Bryan know as much about "imperialism" in 1900 as he knew about the gold standard in 1896?
