Artesian water has been found in Harney county at a depth of 68 feet. It is believed that flowing wells will not only soon be common in Harney, but also in Lake and elsewhere in Southern Oregon. It would be a

wise thing to experiment in Klamath county and see what there is below ground in the line of water.

L. LaFlamboy and E. W. Russell of Ashland, Wis., Thomas S. Ness of Washburn, Wis., and Newton S. Putnam of Klamath, Cal., were here this week on their way to the Lakeview land office to prove up on their timber claims.

Ashland Tidings: Ex-Sheriff E. W. Gowen and family of Klamath county, who have been sojourning at points along the coast from Coos county to Crescent City, Cal., spent a few days in Ashland, and leave for their home to-morrow.

Hon.linger Hermann at his recent speech in Medford, had the largest crowd in attendance that was ever before in Southern Oregon. He is a forcible and convincing speaker, and will probably be the next U. S. senator from this state.

Spencer creek, the coming new railroad town of Klamath county, is growing quite encouragingly. Two buildings, one of them a store, are completed and a large hotel is soon to be commenced. In addition, a number of residences are expected to be built.

Lakeview Examiner: Louis Gerber, the rustling stock buyer of Klamath, was here last week and went to the northern valleys to receive some beef cattle he had purchased. He got 125 head from George Small of Silver Lake, 70 head from E. N. Hazleton, and 222 head from Jack Partin Jr. of Summer Lake, besides about 30 head from other parties. He also bought 2,800 sheep from Joe Coleman, to be received November 10th. Mr. Coleman has 5,000 sheep left.

J. H. Jardine took over to Ashland last week and from there shipped to the proprietor of a snake farm near Rochester, Minnesota, 700 snakes. They are the bug-eating, fly-catching and mosquito-killing variety of snakes, and as rattlesnake destroyers they have no equals. Hence the demand for them, and hence the collecting together of this herd of 700 public benefactors and the shipping of them to a distant and less favored country. They were sent by express and the cost of so doing was \$75.

Messrs. Thompson and Lyman of the Midland Construction Co., who were at Ashland last week to attend a meeting of the directors of the Oregon Midland R. R. Co., have returned to Chicago, accompanied by Mr. Hale, the contractor, and Mr. VanHorne, the general manager of the road. From all that we can learn, the commencement of the work has been unavoidably delayed a few weeks and possibly until the first of next month. Preparations for building the road are being rapidly pushed forward so there will be no delay after the work is actually commenced, and we understand that a very large force of men and teams will be employed in order to finish the road to Spencer creek within a year.

A SERIOUS ACCIDENT.

John Hunsaker, an old and respected resident of Klamath Falls, met with a shocking accident on Monday afternoon. He started alone in his buggy to go to the Rhodes place after a cow, taking with him his Winchester rifle, which, it appears, he placed in the front of the buggy with the barrel leaning against the seat and pointing upward. He had proceeded about two miles, when, probably by his foot accidentally coming in contact with the hammer of the gun, it was discharged. He has no recollection of it. The ball entered his arm below the elbow, and ranging up shattered the bones and elbow and mangled the flesh in a terrible manner. From the shock he fainted and fell from the buggy. He recollects finding himself on the ground, and that the horse had stopped. After long and painful efforts he was enabled to rise and climb into the buggy again and turn the horse towards home. Mr. W. A. Brown met Mr. Hunsaker driving down the hill west of town near the Lewis place, and seeing that he was badly wounded and almost delirious from pain, accompanied him home. Drs. Hargus and Reames were immediately called, who on examination found the bones of the arm so badly broken up that it was impossible to save it from amputation. On Tuesday they performed the operation, their patient withstanding the shock very favorably considering his advanced age, about 77 years. His naturally strong constitution is much in his favor, and with the excellent attention of his physicians he will probably recover.

A BIG IRRIGATION PLANT.

Mr. Henry Ankeny who was here this week, and who is well known to this county as one of the most influential and wealthy citizens of Southern Oregon, and whose activity and success have heretofore been fully shown in mining and banking, has made a purchase which will undoubtedly prove to be of great benefit to land owners. He bought on Monday an undivided half of the irrigating ditch which now starts from upper Klamath lake, and from thence, passing through this town, runs eastward several miles. But it is not large enough to meet the increasing demand for irrigation. The present owners of this ditch are Mr. Ankeny and J. T. Henley, and we understand that the design is to either enlarge and lengthen the present ditch, or if needed, to make an entirely new ditch from the lake, cutting through or tunneling the hill and making a great canal sufficient to irrigate thousands of acres of land. Such a great irrigating canal will very likely be the most probable result.

THE KLAMATH RIVER RAILROAD.

Redding Searchlight: The Midland Construction Company of Chicago has been awarded the contract of building a railroad from Redding, Cal., to Klamath Falls, Or., a distance of eighty-three miles for \$2,150,000.

The foregoing paragraph appeared in the Appeal to Reason of September 22d, a newspaper published in Girard, Kansas. The news was doubtless taken from a Chicago paper. It is correct so far as it applies to Redding.

The railroad in question will depart from the Southern Pacific line either at Ager or Klamath, Siskiyou county. The news, that a contract has been let, however, is doubtless authentic. The railroad will open up a rich section of Southern Oregon.

The Appeal to Reason's interest in the matter was based on the item that the projected railroad would be bonded for \$3,000,000 when only \$2,150,000 would be required to construct it, apparently leaving a profit of \$850,000.

The Appeal overlooked the strong probability that the bonds might not sell at par, and that even if they did some money would be required to equip the road with rolling stock, machine shops, round houses, station buildings, etc.

KLAMATH AGENCY.

The Rev. Jesse D. Kirk, the Indian preacher and interpreter on the Klamath reservation, was at the M. E. conference at Ashland last week, and according to the Tidings, reported progress and prosperity among his people. There are over 1000 Indian men, women and children, wards of the U. S. government, on the Klamath reservation. They are made up principally of the Klamath tribe, with about one-third of them Modocs, a few Pitt Rivers, who were the slaves of the Modocs, and a Yehoskin band of the Snake River Indians.

The lands of the reservation have been allotted in severalty to the Indians, and they have been engaged during the past year in placing boundary fences, building irrigation ditches on the meadows, and con-

structing buildings and barns. Some cultivating has been done where the land can be farmed, while all of the Indians have more or less stock and some horses. One of them, Henry Jackson, who lives on the Yainax portion of the reservation, has over 600 head of cattle and a large number of horses, and is regarded as the wealthiest man among them. He is a Pitt River Indian. The greater number of the Indians are now looking out for their own living; and the probabilities are that they will be entirely self-supporting within a few years' time. They are readily taking to the education of their children and are sending them to the two schools that are located on the reservation,—the boarding school at the Klamath agency having over 120 and the Yainax school 100 scholars. Some eight or nine of the young Indians were sent to the Indian school at Carlisle, Penn., last year. Four of them are at Chemawa, in Marion county.

The Indians are reported as contented and even happy under their new conditions. Many thousands of acres of their grass lands are going to waste for want of cattle to pasture on them. The Indians are permitted to hire these lands out for pasturage purposes and are more than anxious to rent them to stock men for that purpose. The present agent, Capt. O. C. Applegate, is very much liked by the Indians. Most of the improvements made by them have been since under his charge.
