

A monster parade of republicans took place at Chicago on Saturday, estimated to have numbered 150,000, and was 6 hours in passing the reviewing stand. It was the grandest display in numbers and enthusiasm ever seen in that city. As a matter of course, the parade was attacked at various points by mobs, and many of the marchers, including some of the speakers, were severely injured by the bricks, paving blocks and mallets thrown by the attacking party.

The New York Sun, the most reliable and influential paper in New York, says: "It seems that Bryanite bluffs of carrying New York are causing some anxiety among supporters of sound money at the west. Let them dismiss all such misgivings. New York will go for McKinley, and there will not be a State in the Union which will give a greater majority for him. No intelligent and discerning politician here, Republican or Democrat, has any doubt of McKinley's carrying the State."

The only fear we entertain in respect to the early construction of the projected railroad is the remote possibility of Bryan's election and the consequent withdrawal of capital from investment. Though this county or even probably this state cannot change the result, yet the re-election of McKinley is something in which every person here is personally and vitally interested. We want railroads and other enterprises and we want our varied resources developed largely and rapidly, and we don't want a change from the present stable administration to one that will breed distrust and delay our chances.

Bryan in the exuberance of his delight over the great parade and tumultuous welcome which Tammany gave him on his recent visit to New York, burst out with the exultant cry, "Great is Tammany, and Croker is its prophet." When he uttered those words he gave notice to the American people that should he be elected to office Croker would be a power in the administration. Thus Tammany becomes a national issue. It is no longer a question of its control of the city of New York only. It is a question whether it shall be permitted to dominate the politics of the whole nation. S. F. Call.

Vaughn is in captivity and confesses to his fiendish crime, for which justice should be meted out to the fullest extent of the law. In some countries, considering the atrocity of his crime, he would be summarily given a little experience on an air platform.

All rejoice that election is less than a week off. It will determine the politics of the national administration for another four years and settle the question as to whether our prosperity

is to grow or lessen. There is really every indication that an immense majority will vote against a change and for a continuance of this era of good times. With election past and McKinley and republicanism triumphant, the threats of calamity leaders will be dispelled and accordingly the arteries of trade and investment will be quickened with new life. To some degree always, though less so this year than usual on account of the strong assurance of republican success, the few months immediately preceding a presidential election disturb the business of the country. The possibility of a change of policies leads capital to rest and await the result before giving its hand to new enterprises. Men of moderate means, contemplating investments, scent the stagnation in big monetary circles, and also await the outcome and a renewal of confidence and activity. The apprehensions of both those who have much or little wealth combine to suspend growth and development. Thus, we have reason to be thankful that the suspense will soon end with the election which is only a few days off.
