Was First Used on a Dentist's Appren tice in Edinburgh.

An apprentice to the Edinburgh surgeon-dentist, Mr. Imlach, named T. D. Morrison, was the first patient in England to take chloroform. It was on the 10th of November, 1847, at 1 p. m., in the house, 55 Queen street, Edinburgh, that Prof. Simpson administered the chloroform to this young man. Six weeks before that Mr. Morrison had \$19.00. taken ether in order to have a tooth extracted, and when he desired to have another tooth pulled he was told of the discovery of a new anaesthetic by Prof. \$20. Simpson, and asked if he would submit to the test. 
