School Superintendent DeLap has made arrangements to hold a special teachers' institute at Bonanza on Friday and Saturday, June 7 and 8. The program to be carried out will be interesting and profitable.

Moore Bros.' sawmill has suspended operations this week for the building of a contrivance to carry sawdust and prevent it from dropping into the river. The mill will resume with full force next Monday.

S. H. Yeager, M. Dalton, M. W. Caskey and Seth Cox of Pockegama were here Tuesday on land business. They believe railroad building and big development in this county are sure for the near future.

Alex Martin Sr. of Oakland, Cal., but whose home is naturally in this land of health and enjoyment every summer, arrived here this week and will remain several months. His numerous friends in Klamath county are glad to see him.

Louis Dennis who lives near Pelican Bay on Big Klamath lake, has sold his ranch of 480 acres, together with his cattle, horses, steamboat and other personal property, to B. B. Griffith of Sumpter, Or. The price paid for the whole was \$6,000.

Chas. R. McCormick, capitalist of Portland, was here the fore part of the week to investigate some timber investments which he contemplates making in this county. He left Monday evening for San Francisco, and expects to return here within a few weeks.

S. H. King of Fort Klamath came down from that place this week and will make a business trip to Bonanza before he returns home. He reports that times are good and business brisk at Fort Klamath, and that large tracts of timber are changing hands.

Fort Klamath hunters have added a new sort of dog to the zoological world. Last week they found in the neighboring mountains four wild dogs, three of which were taken alive. The other lost his life in his valiant struggle for freedom. The dogs were as fierce as hyenas, and were indomitable fighters, and did not resemble

wolves in build, characteristics or color. Several years ago the Indians reported the existence of a great colony of wild and vicious dogs in the mountain fastnesses, and such report is confirmed by the present capture.

The abundance of rain which has fallen during the past week is worth thousands and tens of thousands of dollars to this county. Every crop is booming, and all nature is laughing with joy. The result is that we shall have the greatest yield of alfalfa, grain, potatoes and fruit that has been seen for years.

Helen D. Hartford of Newburg, state president of the W. C. T. U. of Oregon, will lecture in the Presbyterian church at Klamath Falls on Friday evening, June 7, at 8 o'clock. Mrs. Hartford will probably give an address at the same place the following Sunday evening. Come and hear her.

J. W. McCoy of Fort Klamath was here Monday. He stated that the road from Fort Klamath and the Wood river country along the east side of Big Klamath lake to this place would require only a few days' work to put it in good order for travelers and loaded wagons. He also said that parties in his neighborhood had recently bought a road grader which will arrive there in a few days.

It is said that the only passes through the mountains between east- and western Oregon for a railroad to traverse so as to avoid tunnels and other almost insurmountable difficulties, is the route along the Columbia river and the route up the Klamath. According to the R. R. surveys up the Klamath, not a tunnel, nor deep cut, and scarcely a trestle work or bridge is necessary.

Chas. Steeman and family and Theron Dart arrived here last week from Stockbridge, Wis., to locate permanently. They are relatives of E. N. Osborn and the Allen brothers. Messrs. Steeman and Dart like this country very much as far as they have seen it, and will engage in farming. They state that a large number of the residents of their part of Wisconsin are expecting to come here this season.

The L. O. O. F. lodge of this place had a business meeting on Saturday evening and made a final decision in favor of the new building which they have talked of erecting on Main street. A committee to take the matter in charge was appointed, and in a few weeks it is hoped the work will be commenced. The cost will be about \$5,000. The size will be about 50 by 100 feet, built of stone, completed in an attractive style, and the lower story to be occupied by a store. The names of the committee appointed are W. W. Hazen, Geo. Hurn and Frank Arant.

J. F. Goeller arrived from Ashland on Saturday, and brought with him a valuable lot of machinery, which he bought at San Francisco last winter, and which was shipped to him at Ashland by rail. The machinery was made expressly for his planing mill at this place, and is of the best make and latest style. It consists of a planer and matcher, band saw, automatic sash clamp, and papering machine, etc., all being as complete a lot of machinery as was ever brought into the county, and one which will prove entirely useful and satisfactory to the patrons of his establishment. Like all other enterprising citizens, Mr. Goeller is preparing for the enlarged and more extensive business era now coming in this part of Oregon.

Messrs. Geo. T. Baldwin and Dr. F. D. Reames of this place made a flying trip to Lakeview last week. But quick as they went and returned, and short as their stay was, they had an enjoyable visit and came back with enthusiastic praises of Lakeview and its progressive citizens. While there Dr. Reames took a leading part in organizing a lodge of Knights of Pythias. In speaking of them the Examiner says: Dr. F. D. Reames and George T. Baldwin, leading citizens of Klamath Falls, and "nobble Knights," were in Lakeview Tuesday night assisting in the instituting of the Knights of Pythias lodge. Both gentlemen formed many pleasing acquaintances and warm friendships in Lake's county seat.

Jas. Boyd who came here from St. Paul with his wife and two sons last fall and located on a ranch which he bought near Bly, was in Klamath Falls the fore part of the week on business relating to some improvements which he proposes to make. He owns about a thousand acres of land, and since last September has, in conjunction with his sons, built three miles of fence, built a residence and other buildings and plowed 200 acres, 100 of which have been seeded. Mr. Boyd has now a project afoot to build an irrigating ditch for the exclusive use of his big ranch. The proposed ditch will carry 1,100 inches of water and taking a circuitous course will have a length of eight miles. Mr. Boyd has planted fifteen acres to broom corn—a new crop for the Sprague river country—and says it is doing first class. He reports that crops of all kinds are in excellent condition and that the prospects for his country generally couldn't be better.

FATALLY SHOT.

H. H. Davis, a merchant of Medford, and his wife, came across the mountains last week to enjoy a few days' outing in the neighborhood of Fort Klamath. Yesterday they arrived here from the Agency and were on their return to Medford. The broken condition of the bridge preventing them from crossing, they procured a boat and went fishing on the lake. About 5 p. m. they returned to the shore, and while Mr. Davis was taking his gun from the boat, the lock caught on the seat and he received a heavy charge of shot which struck in the left breast just below the heart. He was taken to the hotel and Drs. Hargus and Straw were called. They found the wound

fatal, but his desperate struggle for life prolonged it until about 8 o'clock. The parents of Mr. Davis were telegraphed to at Medford, and immediately started for this place. As soon as death occurred, preparations were made to convey the body to Medford, and at midnight, accompanied by the grief-stricken wife, that sad and final journey across the mountains was commenced. Mr. Davis was aged 23 years and had been married but a few months.

R. R. SURVEYORS AT WORK.

The railroad news which especially affects this part of the country has been very favorable during the past week. In brief, the reports are that a party of Southern Pacific surveyors started from Klamath a few days ago, and are now running a preliminary line up Klamath river, following in part the survey which was made a year ago by the Oregon Midland, and that another and larger company of surveyors, now at Klamath, are preparing to commence next week making a permanent survey over the same ground. A letter which was received this week by a resident of this place from Mark Frain of Beswick, Cal., stated that the first company of surveyors were camped near that place. Similar reports as to the movements and intentions of the surveyors were brought on Tuesday by S. H. Yeager and others residing at Pockegama and Beswick, with the added information that the road now being built up the Klamath from Eureka by Mr. Hammond was interested in this move in connection with the Southern Pacific, with the intention not only of giving an outlet to the timber of Klamath county, but also to connect at Klamath Falls with the Columbia Southern north building from the north, thereby opening the shortest and most direct route to or from the north or east. The route through the mountains, between this place and Klamath, has an easy grade and without a tunnel, and can be traversed with one-fourth of the difficulty and cost now incurred by the S. P. in crossing the Siskiyou.

In addition to this news from the southwest, Mr. Boyd, a prominent stock man living near Bly, 40 miles east, stated, when he was here Tuesday, that a Union Pacific surveyor was in his neighborhood and running a line to the north or west. These different surveys and the work of the Columbia Southern give a strong probability that this country will soon be able to have communication and reach markets in various directions, north, south, east and west. Under such circumstances, Klamath county has a great future before it, a future in which our forests and water powers will be utilized, and by mills, manufactories, stockraising, farming and the rapid increase in wealth and population, make this county one of the foremost in Oregon.

RAMSBY-MARTIN.

The marriage of Mr. Carey Ramsby to Miss Elizabeth Martin took place at the residence of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Martin, in Klamath Falls, last Sunday, at 6 o'clock. Rev. J. M. After congratulations and best wishes were extended, the wedding party repaired to the Hotel Linkville where supper was served in honor of the event.

The bride is an accomplished young lady, is esteemed by a large circle of friends and will make an excellent helpmate for the man of her choice. The groom, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Ramsby, who recently arrived here from Lakeview, is a young man of exemplary habits and well deserves the companion he has won. They will commence housekeeping in the residence formerly occupied by Dr. Wright at this place, and are accompanied by the best wishes of all.

BRIDGE BROKE DOWN.

J. M. Moore with a load of freight weighing 10,000 pounds, from Ager for G. T. Baldwin of this place, was crossing the big bridge, west side of town, yesterday afternoon, when one of the stringers of the bridge broke down. No serious damage resulted to the horses, wagons or freight, the injury being to the bridge. In the course of the afternoon the damage was repaired so that travelers could go across with safety, but we are told that the timbers are partly rotten and liable to give way at any time when heavy loads are crossing. There ought to be, for safety, new and sound timbers; otherwise some much greater disaster may occur. There really ought to be a steel bridge, but if that cannot be had, there should at least be a solid and safe bridge built of timber and plank without delay.
