On Friday Judge Benson returned from Lakeview where he had been holding circuit court for several weeks.

District Attorney Reames returned from court at Lakeview on Friday, and attends court at Klamath Falls this week.

Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Henley left yesterday for San Francisco, where the former will receive medical treatment for stomach trouble.

Mrs. A. C. Beals arrived home Sunday from Portland where she has been receiving medical treatment, her health being much improved.

Reports from Crook county state that timber men from Wisconsin and Minnesota have recently purchased 125,000 acres of timber along the line of the DesChutes river.

Frank Harding and Geo. Kerr and families, who arrived here a few weeks ago from near Portland, have rented J. C. Beach's ranch at Naylox and will locate in this county permanently.

Mrs. Summers, wife of Sheriff Summers, arrived home Tuesday from Portland where she has been for several weeks receiving medical treatment. Her health is greatly improved.

Major W. H. Daly, surgeon on General Miles' staff in Porto Rico, and whose report caused the celebrated "embalmed beef" investigation, suicided on the 9th inst. at his home in Pittsburg.

We hear that Keno is soon to have a mill, the capacity of which will be 100,000 feet of lumber per day. A mill of this size will require the constant employment of at least a hundred men.

Ashland has already raised \$600, with which to have a big "blowout" on July 4th. The managers are negotiating for a lot of fireworks that will surpass any ever displayed in Southern Oregon.

Geo. Loosley of Klamath Agency was here yesterday on his way home from Ager where he met his son Edward, who accompanied him. Edward has been attending the university at Eugene.

If Drs. Hargus and Straw's X-Ray machine can see through a stone wall or a man, why not have it look into the insides of these mountains and see if there is not a gold mine or an oil well hid away somewhere.

Reports of the doings of the surveyors between Klamath and Klamath Falls, show that they are near Hart's ranch in the mountains and about half way to this place, and are slowly moving in this direction.

At the meeting of the I. O. O. F. lodge on Saturday evening, the committee having in charge the erection of the Old Fellows' building, was given another week to perfect and report on the plans and specifications.

Judge Wilts started for Ashland on Monday to attend a meeting of the regents of the Normal school at that place, of which he is a member. Judge Orr, also a member, was unable to go, circuit court being in session.

Indian Inspector McLaughlin arrived here yesterday en route to Klamath Agency where he goes to correct an error in the treaty which he made last year with the Indians for certain lands excluded from the reservation.

David Haugh of Long lake was in town with his team on Saturday, and while here his horses became frightened and ran away and threw him out, cutting his head badly and otherwise hurting himself severely.

Dr. Reames dressed his wounds.

Mrs. Helen D. Harford, state president of the W. C. T. U., lectured here Saturday, Sunday and Tuesday evenings and entertained large audiences. At the close of Tuesday evening's lecture, a Young Women's Christian Temperance Union was organized with fourteen members.

U. S. Marshal Morse of Portland arrived here last week and has since arrested on charges of violating the U. S. law Jack Harbin and Dave Smith, both of Wood river. Harbin gave bail for his appearance before the U. S. court, and Smith started Tuesday morning with the marshal for Portland.

Chief of the weather bureau at Washington announces, after ten years of investigation, that bombardment of the atmosphere will not produce moisture and advises against the waste of money and effort in that line. It is more profitable to build irrigating canals than try to regulate the elements of nature.

A. H. Carson, Commissioner for the Third District, comprising the counties of Douglas, Jackson, Klamath, Josephine, Coos, Curry and Lake reports the condition of the fruit crop to be as follows, the percentage being based on a full crop: Apples, 80 per cent; peaches, 65; pears, 70; prunes, 100; apricots, 75; cherries, 65; grapes, 90; strawberries, 80.

It is reported that the immense wood crop of Lake county will mainly be hauled to Shaniko and there shipped to market instead of being taken to Terno and from thence sent on the N. C. O. R. R. The cause is said to be the high rates over the N. C. O. A big wooden mill at Klamath Falls would be more profitable to patronize than either of the routes above mentioned.

The case of James Taylor and Jas. H. Owen vs. Gilbert C. Lapham was decided in the circuit court here Monday in favor of the plaintiffs. The action grew out of the use of Fish Hole creek, in Sprague river valley, for irrigation. The result gives the plaintiffs 230 inches of water and restrains the defendant from diverting or interfering with the creek during April and May and until June 20 of each year.

Rev. Father Doyle returned Friday from Merrill and departed in the evening, via Ager, for Ashland in order to reach there for Sunday morning services. He held a meeting at Merrill in the interest of the proposed new Catholic church for this town and received very substantial encouragement. He is reported as saying that the church will be built this summer and that work will be commenced as soon as possible.

Jack Harbin pleaded guilty last Monday to the charge of selling liquor without license, made last fall, the understanding being that in view of his having taken out his license since, and being impetuous and broken down in health, an application will be made to the Governor for a remission of his fine. This enabled the Court to discharge the jury on the first day of the term, much to the rejoicing of the jurors and saving to the county.

According to the law relating to fishing, we are told that a man can catch not over 140 head of trout per day. But he has no right to sell them, and if he does, he is liable to be reached for by the long arm of the law. It appears, therefore, that if a trout dinner, he may go and catch them himself, but must not under any circumstances buy them, and woe to the fisherman who sells any to him.

Newspapers in different parts of the state are claiming that one very great cause of the rapid decrease of fish in the lakes and rivers is chargeable to irrigating ditches. The fish go or are carried by the current into the ditch, and not one in a hundred ever returns, but they follow the water and are found scattered over the land under the ditch. All this destruction of fish can be easily avoided by placing screens at the heads of the ditches where the water enters.

A few weeks ago the Express of this place made a vicious and insulting attack on the officers of the Lakeview land office. And now we see that the Lakeview Hustler of last week copied the article from the Express, but instead of crediting it to the Express has credited it to the REPUBLICAN. As the Hustler assumes to be a prominent pattern of truth and reform, we would like to know how it makes the mistake of falsely crediting the article to the REPUBLICAN where it does not belong, instead of the Express where it does belong.

In the northeastern part of Oregon there has recently been extremely cold weather for this time of the year. It has been a longer and stronger siege of cold than has occurred during any spring for the past fifteen years. Every night destructive frosts have wiped out fruit and growing crops until little is left. This has been particularly the case at Baker City and the neighboring country. It has been more than ordinarily cold everywhere in the east this spring, but northeastern Oregon seems to cap the climax. In southern and western Oregon fruit and vegetables have largely escaped frost, and it is likely will not be much injured.

RAILROAD NEWS.
