WAR TAX REDUCTION

The war revenue reduction law, passed by congress just before its adjournment and since signed by the president, makes sweeping reductions in the stamp and tax laws.

Express receipts—tax repealed. Money orders—tax repealed. Bills of exchange, foreign—the rate fixed at 2 cents for each \$100.

Bank checks—tax repealed. Certificates of deposit—tax repealed.

Promissory notes—tax repealed. Telephone messages—tax repealed. Miscellaneous bonds—tax repealed except on bond of indemnity.

Certificates of damage and certificates not otherwise specified—tax repealed.

Charter party—tax repealed. Conveyances (deeds)—exempted below \$2500; above \$2500, 25 cents for each \$500.

Telegraph messages—tax repealed. Insurance—tax repealed on all kinds of insurance.

Leases—tax repealed. Manifests—tax repealed. Mortgages—tax repealed.

Steamship passage tickets—exempted below \$50 in value, and the rate fixed at 50 cents for each \$50 and over.

Power of attorney—tax repealed. Protest—tax repealed.

Warehouse receipts—tax repealed. Proprietary medicines—tax repealed.

Perfumery and cosmetics—tax repealed. Cheating gum—tax repealed.

Legacies—law modified so as to exclude from taxation charitable, religious, literary or educational legacies.

Commercial brokers' tax—tax repealed.

There are also modifications in the present tax on tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, beer, and the sale of products at exchanges.

GRADING ON N. C. O. R. R.

The Alturas Now Era of last Friday says that a crew of twenty-six men has been put to work at clearing off sagebrush along the route over which the N. C. O. R. R. is to be extended. Geo. H. Bailey has secured the contract for grading fifteen miles of the railroad, and this crew of men is working under his employ.

Even this short extension would be of vast benefit to the people of this part of the country, as the worst portion of the road between Alturas and Terno would be covered by the railroad. Freight could then be hauled from the railroad to Alturas at almost any season of the year, as the distance would be only thirty-five miles over a comparatively good road.

The stage journey, which is so greatly dreaded by many travelers, would also be lessened to such an extent that it would no longer be unpleasant.

We are informed by Eliza Smith, who arrived here from Terno Tuesday evening, that the crew of men are making good headway, and that the work of clearing off sagebrush and grading the road is being pushed along as rapidly as possible.
