To show the rapidity with which the forests are being wiped out, J. Sterling Morton, one of the greatest experts on trees in the world, says that for every twenty-four hours the consumption of timber in one form or another equals all that can be produced on 25,000 acres, and that the new acreage planted every day does not exceed 25 acres. At this rate but a few years can elapse before trees will become an almost unknown quantity.

E. W. Russell and wife, formerly of Ashland, Wis., accompanied by a number of friends, stopped here Sunday en route to the Wood river country where a part of the company will select timber claims. Mr. Russell expects to locate permanently in Klamath county, and he and his wife will be gladly welcomed. Klamath where they will remain for several weeks. Mr. Murphy's health is very much improved and he goes east of the mountains in hopes that by the change of climate he will fully recover. His sons, Willie and Livy, will put up 150 tons of hay for Asa Fordyce while in that country.

Exchange: The statement made that the value of the apple crop of this country is greater than that of its wheat production will bring a surprise to many. Thus it is stated that a total yield of apples in 1900 was 215,000,000 barrels. Supposing that an average price of \$2 a barrel was obtained, the aggregate value of the crop was \$430,000,000. The average value of wheat is but a little over \$200,000,000 annually. By this estimate the apple crop is worth about 50 per cent more than our wheat. The exports of apples exceed 4,000,000 barrels a year and it is increasing. The price abroad ranges from \$2 to \$4 a barrel, the most of the fruit bringing nearer the larger price. Its production ranges over a wide extent of country, though few sections of it make the apple their chief reliance for support.

The Petaluma Courier says that the firm of Miller & Lux own 14,530,000 acres of land, nearly all of it used for grazing. The vast area held by the firm is not conceivable to one who has not traveled through the State. It is equal to the area of New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut together. It is half the size of New York and three times the size of West Virginia and an eighth the entire area of California. It is as large as Greece, four times the size of Alsace and Lorraine, and but little smaller than Ireland, and one-third the size of England and Wales together. There is only one thing that Henry Miller, the surviving member of the firm of Miller & Lux, becomes nervous over, and that is discussion of the size of his holdings.

JACKSON COUNTY'S CEREAL CROP. Ashland Tidings: The following crop estimate has been made for Jackson county: On account of the cold weather and lack of rain, the cereal crop of Jackson county will be below the average. From the most accurate information obtainable, fall-sown wheat will average 20 bushels to the acre.

There is an unusually large number of acres in barley. The yield will not be less than 25 bushels to the acre. The number of acres in oats is small, and the yield will be light.

Considerable spring grain is being cut for hay, and this will materially reduce the crop. The wheat crop will be about 225,000 bushels; 100,000 bushels will probably cover the barley yield, and that of the oats will hardly exceed 20,000 bushels. Not more than 20 per cent of the wheat and barley will be exported. The oats will all be consumed at home.

ILL JONES. SECOND HOMESTEAD ENTRIES.

The act of June 5, 1900, provides that any person who has heretofore made a homestead entry and commuted same under section 2301, Revised Statutes, and the amendments thereto, shall be entitled to the benefits of the homestead laws as though such former entry had not been made; but commutation under section 2303, Revised Statutes, shall not be allowed of the land, number and date of entry, or other sufficient data, to identify the same on the records of the office and that it was forfeited or commuted, as the case may be prior to the passage of the act.
