Such educators are: State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman, P. L. Campbell, president of Monmouth Normal; J. Q. Willits, school superintendent of Lake county; Mr. Hayes, of the Southern Oregon Normal at Ashland.

Lakeview Examiner: D. R. Jones has sold 100 tons of salt this year and could have disposed of as much more if he had it. Three years ago he gathered nearly 600 tons from his salt marsh in Warner, and since then none has been gathered on account of the dry seasons. All this has been disposed of at a good price. Next year Mr. Jones will put up a windmill out there and make some vats to catch the salt, and thus the salt produced will be clean and free from dirt. The stockmen use this salt and the demand exceeds the supply.

Here is an item which shows the push of American farmers: "A single county in western Nebraska, Scott's Bluff, already has 60,000 acres of farm land under irrigation, but her enterprising citizens are not yet satisfied. In conjunction with the farmers of Cheyenne county a colossal irrigation scheme has been projected looking toward the reclamation of another like area. Nearly \$500,000 will be required to complete the work, and part of this money is al-

ready in sight. This shows what private push and enterprise will do in absence of state or national aid."

The Yreka Journal of last Friday contains the following paragraph in reference to the railroad soon to be built this way from Klamath: The survey for a railroad up the Klamath river from the vicinity of Virginia Ranch, near Klamath, to a point north of the Oregon boundary, has been completed, and the work of building will soon be commenced. R. R. ties will be ready on the ground before long, and it is claimed that the grading and building will be completed to Pokeyama in Oregon by next spring. There is a great amount of timber all along the route, of 25 miles or more, to make good business in hauling to the S. P. junction, besides other local traffic, including cattle from Oregon now shipped from other points on the S. P. line.

Deputy Sheriff Fountain left Monday morning for Ashland to bring to Klamath Falls under arrest J. W. Geddens who is charged with stealing a horse from W. O. Hill of Fort Klamath. Monday's Tidings gives the following account of the difficulty: On telegraphic information from Sheriff S. T. Summers, of Klamath county, one J. W. Geddens, late of Fort Klamath, was arrested, Friday evening, by Chief of Police G. W. Dodge, charged with stealing a horse from W. O. Hill. The horse was found in the barn of Mitchell Bros., the liverymen on Fourth street. Geddens claimed he borrowed the horse from Hill to take a trip to Ashland, intending to return to Fort Klamath by the Rogue river route. He has, so he says, borrowed the same animal from Hill before and had no thought that keeping the animal a few days longer than the time it was loaned for would result in serious trouble. The Klamath sheriff writes to the authorities here that he will arrive in Ashland tomorrow, Tuesday.

"The Arabian Nights" or "The Gutta Percha Girl," presented at Houston's opera house Saturday night by local talent, was purely and emphatically a comedy.
