The peach season at Ashland is drawing to a close and the Tidings says it has been the most profitable one in the history of the industry at that place. Rev. J. M. Slesmore, of Fort Klamath, has been a guest of her sister-in-law, Mrs. W. D. Johnson, of this city, during the past week. Klamath county is making rapid forward strides in fruit growing.

The yield of apples this year has been sufficient to supply the local demand, and there has been a large increase in the output of pears, peaches, prunes and small fruit. The quality, it may be said with truth, cannot be excelled. The ball and banquet given by G. T. Conner at Merrill last Friday night were attended and enjoyed by a large crowd. The event was a grand success in every detail. Ashland will have its town election in December and its citizens are already becoming agitated over the liquor question, which is made the leading issue. Mr. Marple tells us that as soon as work is commenced on the Klamath and Klamath Falls railroad, he will run a daily line of stages between those places. Monday a deal was made whereby M. B. Rutenic purchased from Judge Smith the stone building occupied by law and real estate offices and situated on Main street. Portland Oregonian: The 10,503 acres of lands in Klamath county, forming an asset of the Portland Savings bank, were sold at auction by Receiver Nixon yesterday. The bidding started at \$2000, and some 75 bids were made. The land was finally knocked down to C. S. and R. S. Moore, for the sum of \$12,500. Mr. Nixon had hoped to secure more for the land. It is not known what the lands cost the bank, as they were turned in by S. Coulter with everything else he had, and credit for the whole was given him on his general indebtedness. It is not definitely known what the amount of the final dividend will be, but Mr. Nixon will apply to the court today for an order to pay it, and he hopes to be ready to begin paying it next Monday. The paying of this dividend will be the last act in the long-drawn-out process of winding up affairs of the Portland Savings Bank. TEACHERS' INSTITUTE. Yesterday saw the close of one of the most interesting and profitable teachers' institutes ever held in the county, and much credit is due Superintendent DeLap for the painstaking manner in which he prepared for and managed the session, and especially for his enterprise in securing a corps of instructors from among the ablest in the state. There were twenty-three teachers in attendance, and their resolution, adopted yesterday, and expressing appreciation and gratitude, was a fitting testimonial of their glad feeling towards the educators who had so greatly benefited them in new ideas and improved methods. As a result, the teachers will return to their educational duties with advanced thought and renewed enthusiasm. The institute lasted three days, beginning Monday. State Superintendent Ackerman of Salem instructed in arithmetic, reading and course of study. President Campbell of the Monmouth Normal handled grammar, psychology and nature work. C. M. Hayes of the Ashland Normal talked chiefly on psychology and reading. Each gave supplemental talks and inspired lively and instructive discussions. President Campbell lectured before a large and attentive audience at Houston's opera house Monday evening. "Industrial Ideals in Education" was his subject, his effort being to show the importance of combining mental and manual training.
