Caution should be exercised to prevent the introduction into Klamath county of any hog disease. There never has been any such trouble in this county and future security along that line should be guarded. It is reported that over 300,000 hogs have died from some plague in northern California during the past six months, which, if a fact, is ample reason for precaution in this county.

In reporting the return of Supervisor Langell from the mountains after concluding his services at the head of the forest rangers, the Medford Mail says that that gentleman traveled 1,100 miles on horseback during the season and that he was kept very busy with his force of men in reducing injury to timber by fire.

According to our latest information, railroad building from Klamath this way has not commenced as yet. We have expected for some time to hear that work had started, and we still expect to hear such news, as it would be in harmony with past indications and reports. But no one, perhaps, and not even those behind the enterprise, can tell exactly when work will begin. It is not an easy task to build a railroad and every preparation must be completed. Small undertakings are often obstructed and delayed, and it should not be surprising or discouraging if gigantic projects like railroad building meet similar experiences. We hope the proposed Klamath-Klamath Falls railroad will not be long delayed in starting, but to tell exactly when it will begin is utterly impossible. We can only gather opinions from occasional reports, which are frequently based on mere conjecture.

Extending irrigation by building storage reservoirs is gaining popular favor and promises to be more generally adopted in all arid districts before long. While George Gould was at Salt Lake City last week, he spoke of this plan in an interview as follows: President Gould gave it as his opinion that what is most urgently needed, not only in this state but throughout the arid states of the West, is the establishment in the canyons and on high grounds of a series of immense reservoirs for storing water to be used in reclaiming great areas in the valleys and deserts. This, he said, would solve the question of irrigation, and to accomplish this end all the arid states should work together.

THE MANILA ITCH.

A few cases of Manila itch, generally so called over parts of the United States where it has prevailed the past year, broke out in Klamath Falls last week and caused the circulation of many groundless reports, much to the injury of the town. The disease has not shown itself to be dangerous and has not become epidemic. The few having it have been practically quarantined and are recovering. There were several hundred cases of the same complaint in the Rogue river valley last year, but no deaths. If it is a species of smallpox, it is of so mild a type that no fear should be felt. However, harmless as the disease may be, it is not desirable, and in this, as in all other diseases that are liable to be infectious, it is the imperative duty of the authorities to restrict and use every means to suppress it promptly. This we understand has been done, by which needless alarm and false reports may be averted. Mr. Stiles, who died at the Klamath House last Friday, did not have the disease termed Manila itch. Last spring he had an attack of measles, from which it is believed he never fully recovered. He had lately caught a cold and altogether developed complications which resulted in his death. We are assured that his case bore no resemblance to the few cases of Manila itch prevalent the past week. The latter are about well and there are no new cases, and while those affected should be restricted until danger of possible infection is past, there is no occasion for fear.

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

I would respectfully notify the public that on account of the appearance of smallpox in the country I have placed the entire Klamath reservation under quarantine restrictions. I would ask all people outside the reservation lines to remain off the reservation for the present. A measure of this kind to be effective must be as nearly complete as possible.
