The Klamath Falls Dramatic Co. has arranged to play the "Gold King" at Merrill next Saturday night.

Work of repairing and strengthening the bridge over Klamath river at this place has been completed.

Dr. A. C. Helm, a former resident of Ashland, died at Sawyer's Bar, Siskiyou county, on the 23rd inst.

Many of the roads in this county are in need of improving and will require much attention in the future.

Yesterday D. W. Anderson brought us some mammoth samples of the potatoes he has raised on his ranch at Olene.

We understand Mr. Johnson, who has been living on Thos. Martin's Lost river ranch, is preparing to remove to Missouri.

Messrs. Reames and Jennings have recently received a large and complete stock of new furniture, at their brick store in this place.

T. B. Goodpasture and family of Bly were registered at Hotel Linkville here Monday. They were on their way to Ashland.

Hotel Nash at Medford was entered and robbed Thursday night of a miscellaneous assortment of clothing, razors, brushes, etc.

W. N. Jones, a timber buyer from Portland, has been inspecting Klamath county forests in company with J. W. Hamaker this week.

While here Saturday C. G. Cray bought his winter supply of vegetables and grain for his hotel at Pelican bay and made the shipment via the steamer Alma.

Except in the matter of apples, Ashland has closed its fruit season, and the tidings figures that over 65,000 boxes have been shipped from that point this year.

J. M. Moore and I. W. Burris have been clearing their lots on Ewauna Heights this week. The former will soon have a house in course of construction.

Paisley Post: Geo. S. Nickerson, who has been employed by the Che-waucan Land & Cattle Co., on the big canal, went to Summer Lake Monday to survey for the telephone line.

Commencing November 1, the Ager stage leaves here at 7 o'clock a. m., making the trip to the railroad a day-light ride. The stage will arrive here every morning, as at present. The fare to Ager has been placed at \$6.

Ed. Bloomingcamp was on Tuesday appointed by Judge Willits administrator of the estate of his brother, Henry Bloomingcamp, who was accidentally killed at Bly last spring. The estate is valued at something over \$10,000.

Victor Nelson, the young Klamath Indian charged with robbing the postoffice at Klamath Agency, was tried before the federal court at Portland last Thursday, resulting in conviction and a sentence to two years in the penitentiary.

Hon. H. E. Ankeny of Jacksonville and Major Chas. E. Worden of this place, were recently advanced to the Court of Honor or 33d degree of Masonry by the Supreme council now in session at Washington, D. C. This is the highest gift of Scottish rite Masonry.

Capt. Schoff arrived the first of the week with the steamer Alma, conveying to Moore Bros.' mill at this place from the Pelican bay country the biggest raft of logs ever brought down the lake at one time. There were in the neighborhood of half a million feet in the raft.

S. L. McNaughton of the Ager-Lakeview stage line came in from Merrill Tuesday. He reports that Thos. Martin & Son's flour mill at that place is enjoying a big rush of business from Lake and Modoc county farmers, who are thus supplying themselves for the winter.

G. G. Cray, proprietor of the Pelican bay pleasure resort, M. O. Warren, piano tuner of Eugene and W. Holland, boat builder of Marshfield, Or., were Klamath Falls visitors last Saturday. Mr. Holland was here in the interest of putting gasoline launches on Big Klamath lake.

The town board has passed a health ordinance which completely covers all requirements in restricting and preventing the spread of contagious or infectious diseases. The ordi-

nance should and undoubtedly will be rigidly enforced on the appearance of any disease that is liable to spread.

Judge J. S. Orr and family departed last Friday for Shasta Valley, where Mrs. Orr and children will visit relatives a few weeks before proceeding to their future home at Reno, Nevada. The Judge returned here Monday evening to finish some business before making the change to his new location.

Dry weather in the vicinity of Albany has inspired the farmers there to pray for rain. We presume any day in the year that it doesn't rain in the Willamette Valley is accepted by residents as a threat of a terrible drouth. So unaccustomed are old settlers of the Willamette to sunshine that they can stand only a few hours of it at a time.

Lakeview Examiner: Mr. and Mrs. Fred Moore, assisted by the local talent of Klamath Falls, will give a dramatic entertainment, "The Gold King," at Merrill next Saturday.

The people of Lakeview would give the company a royal welcome should they accept an invitation to come here and give one or two performances. Come over, friends, and enjoy Lakeview's hospitality.

When the irrigating ditch is enlarged, it can be used by boats on the Upper Klamath lake in making closer connections with this place. If the width of the ditch is increased to twenty-five feet, as is contemplated, it will accommodate as large boats as will be necessary on the lake for many years to come. Thus the mile or two between here and the present landing can be easily obliterated.

The executive committee of the Klamath County Stockmen's association, recently organized, met at Bonanza Saturday and framed and adopted by-laws. The association comprises representative stockmen of the county and its objects are to protect its members against fraud and theft of stock, enforce the live stock laws of the state and advance the interests of stock-growers generally.

Lakeview Examiner: Joe Howard of Silver Lake started recently for Lost River, Klamath county, with 600 head of his beef cattle. He will feed at Lost river before driving to the railroad to sell. About all of the other beef of Silver Lake have been sold. The 185 head of cattle driven out from Warner by the D. R. Jones vequeros were sold at Klamath Falls to Mitchell Bros. The two and three year old steers brought 6j and the cows 5j cents.

We have heard of no more cases of Manila itch. The few who were charged with having it are recovering and most of them are well, and we believe that in a few days the Manila itch business will be remembered only as a dream. As to us who live here, and have escaped the perils of a rather disagreeable form of itch, we can again with safety turn our attention to the business of promoting railroads and building steamboats on the upper lake.

Two cases of "didn't know it was loaded" are reported by the Examiner to have occurred lately in Lake county. H. Manning accidentally discharged a revolver, the bullet penetrating the wrist of his left hand. Two boys of the Cluff family, aged 9 and 11 years, were playing with a shotgun when it accidentally discharged while in the hands of the younger one, the shot perforating the flesh of his brother from the knees to the top of his head. But he will recover.

About thirty members of the A. O. U. W. lodge had a pleasant time at their meeting Tuesday night. After an excellent lunch, the propriety of establishing a high school in Klamath Falls was brought up for impromptu discussion. The numerous talks showed unanimous favor to such a movement, and before the session closed subscriptions amounting to \$60 were secured to be used in spreading information regarding the advisability of taking advantage of the high school law.

Baker City Republican: Oil has been discovered at a depth of 1,200 feet in Louisiana. When such depths have been reached in the Malheur district, perhaps this region will have something to show the world. Experts are giving surface indications warm evidences; depth may contain its own eulogy. When it is considered that the first oil struck at Beaumont was below the 600-foot level, and that the gusher came from a level beyond 1,600 feet, it is well to hold the breath till the auger is deep into the oil formation found in Malheur.

When or where the following newspaper extract was published, we do not know: The following remedy for smallpox has the merits of cheapness and simplicity. It is also harmless. "I am willing to risk my reputation as a public man," wrote Edward Hines to the Liverpool Mercury, "if the worst case of smallpox cannot be cured in three days simply by the use of cream of tartar dissolved in one pint of hot water drunk at intervals when

cold is a certain, never failing remedy. It has cured thousands, never leaves a mark, never causes blindness and avoids tedious lingering."

The Lakeview papers say the report that there was a case of smallpox in that town is not true; that a case of chickenpox broke out there and that a few cases of the same disease prevail west of there. When Shakespeare said, "What is there in a name?" and "A rose by any other name smells as sweet," or words to that effect, he didn't think how names of diseases act on people. It makes a vast difference whether one calls the disease which has prevailed in nearly every part of the United States the past year, smallpox, chickenpox or Manila itch. The disease is not very severe, but the name has a telling effect on the mind.

A COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL.

As a matter of economy and necessity a county high school is something which reflecting citizens of Klamath county will recognize as of paramount importance. We have a large and rapidly increasing population, and a proper solicitude for the young demands a first class educational establishment. Nor is it difficult or expensive to provide such a school. The assessed valuation of the county is about \$2,300,000, and a tax for the support of the school would be so trivial as to be hardly noticed. Thus a tax of merely one mill on each dollar of the valuation, would provide \$2,300, an ample sum for the yearly support of a county high school, while a tax of ten mills on the dollar at the start, to erect school buildings, would give \$23,000, a sum sufficient to build and equip in excellent style, all such school buildings as may be necessary for years to come.

All who have families naturally desire to educate their children, and

all realize the importance of so doing. All probably would, to accomplish that purpose, gladly give many times the trivial tax required. As the case now stands, citizens are often compelled to send their children away from home to more advanced schools outside the county to be educated at great expense, when it could be easily done at home at a saving of ninety-nine one-hundredths of the expense and trouble by having a Klamath county high school. We hope the citizens of the county will carefully and candidly think over this matter of having a high school, and compare the cost and benefit, and if they do we believe they will unanimously favor it.
