(Lakeview Examiner.) After a hard fought contest by county, and a jury, came to a close over to that body to find a verdict. before its close the judge, jury, withesses and lawyers were worn out with the proceedings. District Attorney Reames had his case well prepared and fought with a determination to procure a conviction. Messrs. Coggswell, Hammond and Bell contested every foot of ground stubbornly and handled their case admirably. The arguments on both sides were completed shortly after the noon hour Friday, and after the court had given its instructions to the jury the court room was vacated and the case was left to the jury for deliberation. All that afternoon and night, and up to 10 a. m. Saturday the jury balloted, but without an agreement. The foreman at that time sent a message by the bailiff to Judge Benson, informing him of the utter impossibility of reaching a verdict, and asking that the jury be discharged. Upon the court becoming satisfied that the body could not come to an agreement, the jury was thereupon discharged.

It has since been learned that the jury stood eight for conviction and four for acquittal. On the first ballot it stood five for acquittal and seven for conviction, the second four to eight, and the third five to seven. After that until the close, the ballot was four to eight.
