Senator Hoar expresses favor to banishing anarchists to some mid-ocean island, and there let them run things to suit themselves.

Crocker has made his annual exit from the political stage, and now declares that he will not return to the leadership of the Tammany forces.

Inspired by a report that he proposed to return to the republican fold, Senator Dubois of Idaho declares that he will stick to the democratic party. He is an exception to the rule.

President Roosevelt gives the Pacific Coast its full share of recognition in his message. Chief among other things is the Nicaraguan canal, which he is heartily in favor of, and urges its construction as soon as possible.

N. S. Merrill of Merrill was doing business in Klamath Falls Tuesday.

The school superintendent of Indiana has instructed eighth grade and high school teachers to insist upon students reading President Roosevelt's message. He believes the document furnishes an excellent opportunity for study of current history, civics and English.

Bills have been introduced in congress to eradicate anarchy, and before the season ends the authorities promise to be amply backed by laws to handle the treasonable and most dangerous element in society. One bill in the senate, provides the death penalty for any one who kills or attempts the life of the president of the United States or any officer thereof. It also makes aiding or wilfully advising such crime a penitentiary offense. Another bill provides for "the exclusion and deportation of alien anarchists."

President Roosevelt's message, which had been awaited with keen interest, was presented to congress on Tuesday of last week. It is a voluminous document, containing about 20,000 words, but every syllable of it is worth reading. It is wise, straightforward, plain-spoken and intensely patriotic. It pays an excellent tribute to the memory of the late President McKinley, and denounces anarchy in vigorous terms, urging congressional action to rid the country of such baleful element. The needs of the nation are reviewed at length, and the reader at once appreciates the president's wide information, good judgment and high-minded purpose. It is a very able message and is universally recognized as such.

Oregonian: A bill providing for a pension of \$5000 a year for Mrs. McKinley has been very properly introduced thus early in the session by the representative of the late President's Congressional district in Ohio. While as a matter of equity no one should receive from the Government an allowance that is not necessary for his or her support, precedent properly governs in the case of a President's widow, and the pension asked will be granted without a dissenting voice. Mrs. Garfield and Mrs. Grant each drew a pension of \$5000 a year, not because of any need that exists, but as a token of the nation's appreciation for the services rendered by their husbands and as a tribute to the high office which they held. The addition of Mrs. McKinley's name to this list of pensioners will meet with prompt indorsement by the people.

We are informed that certain persons between here and Lakeview and also between Ashland and Portland are persistently telling the traveling public that they cannot go over the Ashland and Klamath Falls Stage line when it is a well known fact that it makes the best time, most comfortable rigs and is the best road.
