### FREE SHOWS NIGHTLY.

Gentlemen of the jury: We have now come to the last stage of this long case. Gentlemen of the jury, I want to thank you personally for the kindness with which you have listened to our wrangles and listened to our witnesses and giving this case the complete and careful attention you have given it during this long period. In regard to the duties of parties in this case, I will say the defendant is represented by four able counsel, members of the Supreme Court of this State, and it is their duty to acquit the defendant by all means at their disposal.

The position of the counsel for the people is this: They are salaried officers; to them it makes no possible difference what may be the result in the case. They are not concerned in a verdict, except that it is their sworn duty, however bitter it may be, to bring before the jury the evidence, to present to the court the law and then ask of you a verdict that one of your fellow men be hanged by the neck until he be dead. If you believe that this man is innocent, the counsel for the prosecution asks you earnestly to acquit him. But if you come to a conclusion that this man is guilty, then the whole state of California demands at your hands a verdict according to the evidence.

I do not ask you to consider the enormity of the crime in determining whether the defendant is guilty or innocent, but if you do find him guilty, the enormity of the crime is such that the whole people of the state of California would come over here into Modoc and say: "Stand up and be the citizens you have sworn yourselves to be." The indictment charges the defendant, on the 31st of May last, with having willfully and with malice aforethought murdered Martin Wilson. The evidence commences on May 27, when some of these parties, including Martin Wilson, were arrested and taken to Myers' hotel in a manner that first showed a bitter feeling on the part of the arresting officers.

Here Deputy Attorney General Sturtevant was interrupted by Raker. "Raker—I take exception to the language of the counsel in regard to these arrests. We attempted to show in good faith and by facts leading up to the arrests that these men were legitimately charged with having committed a public offense. Sturtevant—I don't object to the counsel taking exceptions, but I do object to a speech from him.

Post—We do not deny the authority for making the arrests, but we desire to show the excessive brutality of the arresting officers, who exceeded their duties in the manner of making the arrests.

The court—Mr. Raker, I anticipated disturbance in this argument by you and in advance very kindly and courteously laid down the parliamentary rules by which the argument should be conducted. If you wish to violate these rules I will remove you from the courtroom.

Speaking of the above case, the Alturas Era says: Last Tuesday afternoon another example of personal prejudice of the court against attorneys for defendant was exhibited, as the judge sent John E. Raker and C. A. Raker to jail without any cause or reason, as those gentlemen were merely making objections to questions propounded, and taking exceptions in a quiet, gentlemanly manner, and as the law permits them to do in the interests of their client.

#### NORRIS-DOLLARHIDE FEUD.

(Ashland Record.)

Jack Norris, while under the influence of liquor at Klamath last week, began abusing John W. Dollarhide and Mr. Dollarhide kept warning him to leave him alone that he did not wish to talk to him. Mr. Dollarhide's son John later met Norris and was prepared for him with a pistol which was discharged and the bullet grazed Norris' forehead. Norris was taken to Yreka and the friends of his brother shipped him to Centralia, Wash., on Sunday afternoon's train.

It will be remembered that young Wesley Dollarhide while under the influence of liquor became involved in a quarrel with this same Jack Norris over a year ago and in placing Dollarhide under arrest Jack Norris' brother, Deputy Sheriff and Constable Norris, killed Wesley Dollarhide. The Dollarhides have felt very sore over the matter ever since and until recently Jack Norris, the source of the trouble, has been kept away from Klamath. He is a very disagreeable and troublesome person when drunk and anything but a desirable citizen at any time.

#### A PROTEST

From Bonanza against leasing the range, is clipped from the Oregonian of Feb. 13th, viz:

Let the Government alter the homestead law so that everyone over the age of 15 can take up a homestead of 320 acres, let the requirements as to residence and cultivation be done away with and I venture to say that in a very short time most of the "range" will be under fence. It seems to be generally acknowledged that the range must be fenced and taken care of, but to ask the Government to pass a bill that shall provide that the more cattle and more land an individual or corporation has, the more public domain he shall be able to control, seems to me unjust to the last degree.

On this question people seem to be divided into just two parties, viz., those for and those against leasing. May I venture to suggest that leasing is not the only remedy, and we small stockmen are not forced to allow this to be so just because the rich stockmen and powerful cattle corporations are trying their hardest to persuade the government that leasing is the only way to preserve the range.
