The local campaign is moving along quietly and with little show of animosity on either side. While the canvass of candidates will doubtless soon become active and continue in a spirited fashion until after the

polls close on election day, there is promise among nominees and supporters of both parties of clean work, free from chicanery, mud politics and personal vituperation.

No man in the county is more competent for the sheriff's office than Capt. J. W. Siemens and his multitude of friends will be glad to see him triumph.

O. A. Stearns is an early settler, understands the affairs and needs of the county thoroughly and is just the man to trust with the duties of county commissioner.

President Roosevelt believes that the promise to give Cuba reciprocity should be carried out and is determined that congress shall not adjourn without making such concession.

All admit that A. Castel will make an ideal county clerk and is fitted exactly for the place. That he will ride into office on the wave of popular opinion is reasonably assured.

H. H. Van Valkenburg's exactitude in caring for the county's money commends him strongly to the favor of the voters, who realize the importance of retaining his valuable services.

Labor troubles have again broken out in San Francisco, this time affecting street car service. The strike among employes began Saturday evening and has caused serious inconvenience to the public.

As county judge and presiding officer of the county court, Judge Willits has, by careful methods, been instrumental in saving the county many dollars during the past four years. Thus his record deserves his return to the important trust.

The Oregonian has lately been showing up the methods of confidence men who are "working" strangers in Portland, and has applied caustic criticism to the police for their failure to rid the city of the undesirable class. It seems that many unwary people have been gullible there lately by professional sharks.

Geo. Chamberlain has promised to reform governmental practices in this state if he is elected governor,

though it is not shown that he has, in his present position of district attorney at Portland, injured his health in efforts to improve the moral atmosphere of that city. In the matter of forcing reforms he should have been practicing and gaining experience, which he could now point to as qualifications for his proposed enlarged sphere as reformer of the whole state.

Of all parts of the United States, the Pacific Coast is most vitally interested in the retention and development of our possessions in the Orient. The republican party of Oregon makes a declaration for such expansion and progress. The democratic party wants to withdraw from the Philippines, letting the islands drift in a state of semi-civilization and cutting off our opportunities for influence and profit. The result of the June election will be an example to other states and it should be set forth by a majority that will show unequivocal support of the republican stand. No state will be more largely benefited by the developing trade in the Orient than Oregon and every citizen should vote for the party whose policy has been and will be to promote such trade.

GOOD FOR TIMBER APPLICANTS.

The following circular letter from Commissioner Hermann has been received by the register and receiver of the U. S. land office at Lakeview and as will be seen by the amended law, the taking of timber under the timber and stone act has been greatly facilitated:

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR,
GENERAL LAND OFFICE,

REGISTERS AND RECEIVERS,
United States Land Offices.

Gentlemen: Your attention is called to the provisions of an act of Congress entitled "An Act to amend section twenty-two hundred and ninety-four of the Revised Statutes of the United States," approved March 11, 1902 (Public-39), a copy of which is hereto attached.

Under its provisions, all affidavits, proofs, and oaths of any kind thereafter made by applicants and entrymen under the homestead, preemption, timber-culture, desert land, and timber and stone acts, may, in addition to those now authorized to take such affidavits, proofs and oaths, be made before any United States commissioner or commissioner of the court exercising federal jurisdiction in the territory or before the judge or clerk of any court of record in the land district in which the lands are situated.

In case the affidavits, proofs, and oaths hereinbefore mentioned be taken out of the county in which the land is located the applicant must show by affidavit that it was taken before the nearest or most accessible officer qualified to take said affidavits, proofs, and oaths in the land districts in which the lands applied for are located.

Such showing by affidavit need not be made, however, in making final proof if the proof be taken in the town or city where the newspaper is published in which the final-proof notice is printed. Very respectfully,

The amended law reads as follows: An act to amend section twenty-two hundred and ninety-four of the Revised Statutes of the United States.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section twenty-two hundred and ninety-four of the Revised Statutes of the United States be, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 2294. That hereafter all proofs, affidavits and oaths of any kind whatsoever required to be made

by applicants and entrymen under the homestead, preemption, timber-culture, desert-land, and timber and stone Acts, may, in addition to those now authorized to take such affidavits, proofs, and oaths, be made before any United States commissioner or commissioner of the court exercising federal jurisdiction in the territory or before the judge or clerk of any court of record in the land district in which the lands are situated: Provided, that in case the affidavits, proofs, and oaths hereinbefore mentioned be taken out of the county in which the land is located the applicant must show by affidavit, satisfactory to the Commissioner of the General Land Office, that it was taken before the nearest or most accessible officer qualified to take said affidavits, proofs, and oaths in the land districts in which the lands applied for are located; but such showing by affidavit need not be made in making final proof if the proof be taken in the town or city where the newspaper is published in which the final-proof notice is printed. The proof, affidavit and oath when so made and duly subscribed, shall have the same force and effect as if made before the register and receiver, when transmitted to them with the fees and commissions allowed and required by law. That if any witness making such proof, or any applicant making such affidavit or oath, shall knowingly, willfully or corruptly swear falsely to any material matter contained in such proofs, affidavits or oaths he shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and shall be liable to the same pains and penalties as if he had sworn falsely before the register. That the fees for entries and for final proofs, when made before any other officer than the register and receiver, shall be as follows: For each affidavit, twenty-five cents.

For each deposition of claimant or witness, when not prepared by the officer, twenty-five cents.
For each deposition of claimant or witness, prepared by the officer, one dollar.

Any officer demanding or receiving a greater sum for such service shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished for each offense by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars.

THE RAILROAD

(Ashland Town Talk.)

Work is being pushed along on the Klamath river railroad at this time. Between 300 and 400 men are employed and the force is being daily increased as suitable men present themselves, seeking work. The company will begin to lay track from Laird's station this week. The road is graded and ready for the track layers as far as Big Bogus. The iron bridge is being put in across Klamath river, 10 miles from Klamath.

Mr. Hervey Lindley, the vice-president and general manager of the company, who was in Ashland yesterday said: "We expect to continue this road to Big Klamath lake. We have had some preliminary surveys and can effect a good landing at two or three places on the lake, but we have decided on no particular point yet. It may be at or near Pelican Bay. I expect the road to be completed to Pokegama by July and we shall be hauling logs from there then. Klamath Falls will be able to get connection with the road by a branch, not more than six miles in length." Mr. Lindley has great appreciation of the possible natural resources of the Klamath basin country. "There is a country big as Ohio, naturally rich and wonderfully productive with irrigation and industrial development, and there is not a pound of railroad iron in it. It certainly has splendid prospects and invites intelligent investment of capital."

The other officers of the Klamath River Railroad Company are: George Mason, president; J. E. Coffin, secretary; Dean Mason, treasurer, with principal offices at Klamathon.

This company comprises also what has been known to the public as the Pokegama Lumber Company. They have about 80,000 acres of timber land in Jackson and Klamath counties. The writer has described this tract heretofore, as one of the most valuable in the west. It is particularly rich in yellow and sugar pine; the latter is king of the conifers among lumbermen. The present capacity of their mills at Klamathon is 25,000,000 feet, but they are starting to build a new sawmill plant at Laird's, which is to have a capacity of 50,000,000 feet per year. Mr. Lindley says there will be mills at Klamathon and Laird's within 18 months, in operation, which will have a capacity of 175,000,000 feet, as there are other companies which have arranged to erect sawmills there. Three companies are now in negotiation with the Klamath River Railroad Company for the hauling of their logs.

There is likely to be quite a little town at Laird's within a few months.

Cottages are going up there now. The railroad company will erect a roundhouse and machine shops and work is to commence on these, next week. A few stores will go up soon.

Topographically, the natural outlet over the most feasible grades, for the Klamath country, is on the line of this proposed railway, the speedy construction of which is assured, and it is over this line that the commerce of that section will go until it has railway connection with the north, by the Columbia Southern or some other projected road. Klamath Falls will have convenient communication by boat with any point on the Big Klamath Lake, which the new road may touch.

In case the conditions justify the enterprise, she has the natural water power, unrivaled in the state by the way, except at Oregon City, for the operation of an electric connecting line, which as stated would be only about six miles in length.
