W. J. Furnish, Oregon's next governor, met an enthusiastic welcome at Salem last week.

The strike among street car employees in San Francisco ended last Saturday, lasting just one week. The strikers were victorious, most of their demands being granted. They secured a ten-hour day, an advance in wages and recognition of their union. The strike was unusually free from riots and disorder and inspired general sympathy among most classes in San Francisco. The result is a signal victory for labor.

Morton was secretary of agriculture during President Cleveland's administration, and when the split in the democratic party occurred in 1896 he remained with what was known as the gold wing. Here is what Senator Beveridge says about self-government for Filipinos: "If the Filipinos are found capable of self-government, the republican party will give it to them. But the republican party proceeds on facts, not on imagination. And therefore congress has ordered a census of the Philippine Islands for the purpose of informing congress to what extent and in what places Filipinos can govern themselves. Is not this the method of reason? First find the facts and then fit our action to those facts. And while these facts are being gathered, American administration in the Philippines is extending self-government in town and village as rapidly as the Filipinos themselves can manage it. We are teaching them by practice; we are training them by education. If we can make them self-governing, none will hail that consummation with such delight as we who are instructing them. But we will not turn them back to barbarism. We will do our work like Americans and men until all the East shall bless the name of the great Republic and all mankind cheer American beneficence."

#### THE MODOC POINT DITCH.

KLAMATH AGENCY, OREGON.  
April 23, 1902.  
Editor REPUBLICAN: I feel called upon to give notice that the plans for the construction of the Modoc Point irrigating ditch on this reservation, contemplate the employment of Indians wherever practicable. In engineering and in some branches of the work a few expert white men may be needed. I give this public notice because there seems to be, judging by the numerous letters I get, a widespread belief that white men are in demand for this work, when the facts are we have many more able bodied Indians than we can employ on the work. I am very sorry to have to refuse any man who wishes work but this ditch is peculiarly an Indian work and our white friends will have to find work on the railroad or elsewhere. In the interest of these men and the country generally, I am hoping the proposed great ditch enterprise which contemplates the irrigation of the lower Klamath valley, between Klamath Falls and Tule lake, from our larger Klamath lake, will soon materialize. Many inquiries are made in regard to when work is to be resumed on the Modoc Point ditch. I had hoped to resume work with forty or fifty men on May 1, but the Commissioner of Indian Affairs wired me to await instructions, and I am so doing, in the mean time endeavoring with the help of our able bodied men on the reservation, both red and white, to put the roads in good condition. #### ANOTHER RAILROAD.

Account of another projected railroad appeared in a recent number of the Oregonian. The scheme is explained in the following extract from the article:  
It now transpires that B. J. Pengra, who lives in Klamath county, was in Portland a few weeks ago in the interest of a scheme for building a railroad across the state. The project he talked of was to extend from Coos Bay to Salt Lake City, and he mentioned the name of Commissioner Hermann, of the United States General Land Office, in connection with it. It was understood from what he said that at Salt Lake City the Oregon line would form a connection with the Gould system, which would mean a connection with the Rio Grande, the only Gould tracks reaching that point. Mr. Pengra said

engineers had recently made an examination of the route and pronounced it a practicable one for a railroad.

#### BONANZA IRRIGATING DITCH.

(Ashland Town Talk.)  
John Shook, president of the Bonanza Ditch Co., reports that good progress is being made on the ditch and that owners of land along the ditch appear to be generally desirous of bonding it at the rate of \$4 per acre under the proposal of the company. Under the agreement, the ditch company is to receive from the land owners pay for the use of the ditch at the rate of \$4 an acre. If this be not paid within five years the land is to belong to the company. Eventually this ditch will irrigate some 10,000 acres. It will have a length of six to eight miles. Most of the line is over a sandy, loose soil and the excavation presents few difficulties. This enterprise is one of the most important that has been projected for that section of country.
