On Saturday Senator Elkins introduced a joint resolution in the senate providing for the annexation of Cuba and its admission as a state.

Governor Gage of California has commenced legal action against John D. Speckles and W. S. Leake, editor and publisher of the San Francisco Call, charging them with criminal libel. The paper connected Gov. Gage with alleged corruption at San Quentin prison.

President Roosevelt sent a special message to congress on Friday urging favorable consideration of reciprocity relations with Cuba. The island is vitally in need of such assistance at this time, and the president is convinced that concessions will not injure industrial life in this country nor impair the protective system now in vogue here.

Medford is preparing to have a college, of which Prof. Van Soy is to be principal. The citizens of Klamath county will also have a college though it will sail along under the less pretentious name of high school. Here therefore, our young people can have as thorough an education as at Medford or elsewhere and without breaking their backs and patience in climbing rocks and mountains to get there.

In his message asking for reciprocity for Cuba, President Roosevelt disregarded the influence of the sugar kings of this country, who believe their interests will be hurt by the movement, and who exercise their power through a number of U. S. senators. But the president is inspired by his lofty idea of what is fair and right, and refuses to be swayed from duty by the threats of capitalists or politicians. His action will meet the cordial approval of the masses.
