We understand there is a move on foot to prospect for artesian water in this vicinity.

A new postoffice is soon to be established at Olegue with Taylor Wilson as postmaster.

There was no mail from Ager Monday morning on account of trains being delayed by a wreck.

Teachers should remember the local institute at Bonanza on Friday and Saturday of this week.

The annual meeting of the Southern Oregon Normal school will be held at Ashland on the 20th inst.

The front of the building, occupied by Geo. Bradley's harness shop, is being remodeled and improved.

Mrs. W. B. Grubb, who resided with her family near Spencer creek, Klamath county, died on Tuesday last week.

The Journal office at Yreka caught fire on Wednesday of last week, causing some damage before the flames could be extinguished.

On Tuesday I. A. Duffy was circulating among business men to secure the promise of funds for the Fourth of July celebration at this place.

A. Castel has been taking the school census and at the conclusion of his work finds that there are 210 children of school age in this district.

There are two energetic applicants for appointment as postmaster at Ashland—the present incumbent, Geo. Engel, and ex-Mayor J. R. Casey.

We are informed that the hotel at Shovel creek is crowded with guests who have gone to that pleasure resort for recreation and to escape the heat of lower altitudes.

Five special trains of Mystic Shriners passed through Ashland this week en route to their Eastern homes from San Francisco, where they have been attending a big convention.

According to reports Ashland and vicinity will have an immense fruit crop this year. Strawberries are now ripe there and they are fully equal to the Hood river variety in both size and flavor.

Ashland Tidings: Miss Lora Colton left Tuesday for Fort Klamath, where she will remain two or three weeks, and on her return will go to Los Angeles, where she expects to remain during the summer.

Some excellent verses of poetry from the pen of Frank L. Applegate of Klamath Agency, Or., appear in the June issue of the New York Philatelist, a magazine devoted to government postage stamps.

At the annual school meeting Monday afternoon C. H. Withrow and P. L. Fountain were elected members of the school board to succeed A. D. Carriek and L. F. Willits. Capt. J. W. Siemens was re-elected clerk.

Hawaii's volcano, Kilauca, is reported to be discharging sulphurous fumes and hot ashes and apparently getting ready and thus serving notice of its intention to perform in a manner after the fashion of Mount Pelee and Soufriere.

Ashland Tidings: The general deficiency bill, reported in Congress, Saturday, carries \$3000 for road construction and the general improvement of Crater Lake National Park, and \$463 for which to pay H. A. Bands for surveys in Oregon.

F. L. Camps, the well known photographer of Ashland, will be here next Wednesday to assist Miss Maud Baldwin in opening her studio at this place, rooms in the A. O. U. W. building being elaborately and elegantly fitted for the purpose.

If Crater lake is "on a boil," as intimated by the Southern Oregonian, then one thing is sure, viz: That the thousands of cubic yards of soap stone in the surrounding walls of the lake, will soon transform the water into a vast cauldron of soft soap.

Medford Oregonian: Another death has occurred in the Table Rock precinct, a young man, who had just attained his majority, having died of typhoid fever a few days since. His father and mother died of the same disease a short time before.

The Examiner reports that Phil S. Loosley landed a load of fine Ft. Klamath cheese in Lakeview last week. That paper adds that Mr. Loosley thinks of engaging in irrigation projects in Lake county, and expects to return there to look over the ground next month.

Remember the steamboat excursion on Upper Klamath lake next Saturday and Sunday. There promises to be a large crowd and no one can fail to have a good time. Sight-

seeing, fishing, dancing and picnic dinners will be among the things to exhilarate the excursionists.

There is a prospect that a large deal will be completed about the 1st of July, by which several thousand acres of timber land in this neighborhood will be disposed of. Timber land here, is indeed, a conspicuous subject of thought at this time. Its value is well known, hence there are many buyers, and prices are rapidly advancing.

Roseburg Plaindealer: E. R. Hanan and family, accompanied by Aje Smith, Earl Benedict, Will Hagan and Miss Anger Thompson, left this afternoon for Klamath county by private conveyance. The Messrs. Hanan are driving a band of 600 or 700 head of cattle to the Klamath range.

A small riot was precipitated at Grants Pass last Friday by a string of freight cars being jammed into a train occupied by fifty Japanese. The latter became infuriated, rushing out of their cars and attacking the white crew of the freight train. It was a fight with fists and clubs, but officers interfered before any one was killed.

Gov. Geer has announced his intention to pardon Ingram, the life prisoner, for the part he took in trying to prevent the shooting of guards at the penitentiary by desperadoes, Merrill and Tracy. As a result of his effort, Ingram was shot in the leg, necessitating amputation. He was serving a life sentence for killing his brother ten years ago.

According to the new time schedule which goes into effect on the Ashland-Klamath Falls stage line with the new management July 1, the stage will leave Ashland every morning at 5 o'clock and arrive here the same day at 7 o'clock p. m. Leaving Klamath Falls at 5 a. m., the stage will reach Ashland at 7 p. m. thus making the trip either way in one day.

Bills have been posted announcing a grand celebration July 4th in Horton's grove in Poe Valley. There will be shooting contests, races and other similar amusements for which prizes will be offered. There will be a literary and musical program, with an oration, a basket dinner, and a dance afternoon and night. The committee on arrangements is preparing for a big crowd and an enjoyable day.

Medford Mail: Mr. and Mrs. McFall of Central Point just returned last Saturday from a trip to Klamath county on business matters connected with the sale of a ranch, which they formerly owned in that county. While there they visited the home of Wm. Hoagland, an uncle of Mr. McFalls, who is a Medford property holder and an extensive stockraiser, having one of the best ranches in Klamath county.

The hotels continue to be full of guests, and while a few depart occasionally, new arrivals more than make up the loss. Numerous timber buyers and locators of government timber, tourists, sightseers, hunters of deer and trout, and those who love pure air and water, and bounding and unbounded health and good feeling, make up, in a great measure, the crowd that visits Klamath Falls in these enjoyable summer days.

Ashland Tidings: Claud R. Fountain, formerly of Ashland and Klamath Falls, has been recently appointed assistant instructor in physics in Columbia University, New York. Mr. Fountain was graduated at the University of Oregon, at Eugene, one year ago, and was immediately awarded a fellowship at Columbia, where his excellent class-room work won him his promotion. He will teach in the coming Summer school at Columbia.

Maj. Worden arrived Sunday from Ashland, accompanied by A. L. Sargent and Mrs. W. E. Worden and son of Delta, Ohio, who expect to locate here. Mr. Sargent has visited Klamath county twice before while his daughter, Mrs. Worden, resided here, and is sufficiently acquainted with the country to know he would like to live here permanently. Our citizens will be glad to welcome them and hope they may be followed by other Ohio people.

Lakeview Examiner: S. L. McNaughton, popular stage man, arrived from Ager Monday, and went to Surprise Valley to see about his star route contracts. Mr. McNaughton will conduct the service on the Western line for Mr. Yaden until that gentleman winds up his affairs in other localities. In turn the contractor doing service between Ft. Bidwell and the N. C. O. railroad will continue the work until Mr. McNaughton finishes up here.

Lakeview Examiner: It is said that the rabbit pest on the West Side is about to be wiped out by natural conditions. W. R. The formal announcement was made by the reverend gentleman to his congregation in Portland, yesterday morning. The Reverend Mr. McLean began his pastorate in Portland January 15, 1899, having gone there from Grants Pass.

The Southern Oregonian of Medford reports that Crater lake is boiling and steaming and that, with other craters, it had been induced to resume volcanic operations by the eruptions on the island of Martinique. But of course the report is false and was circulated by some one for lack of anything else on which to build a fabrication. People living in the vicinity of the lake would be apt to know about any seismic or volcanic disturbance there. The lake is perfectly placid, and has been so since the big blowup before the glacial period.

Mr. Dutro, the new proprietor of the Ashland-Klamath Falls stage line, and who takes possession July 1, is making extensive preparations to make the route a favorite one for passengers. He is now looking after suitable horses for the business, and will purchase 28 first-class horses which are expected to go over the route, 65 miles, between here and Ashland in fourteen hours. Mr. Dutro on the Ashland-Klamath Falls route, and Mr. Yaden on the route from Klamath Falls to Lakeview, will make a trip between these various towns, one of unalloyed pleasure.

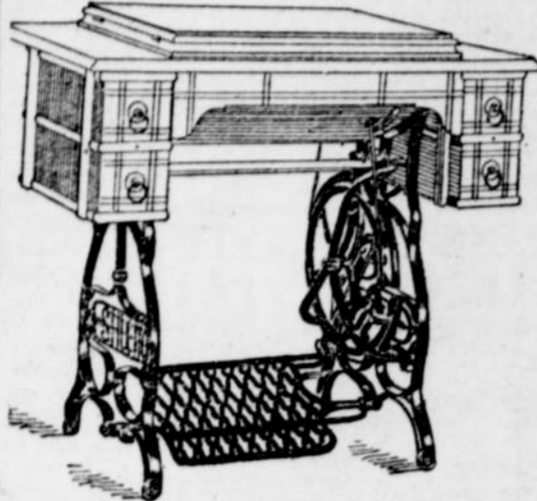
Ashland Tidings: Richard S. Smith, of Klamath county, the well known Oregon athlete, who graduated at the U. O. last year, is now a full-fledged member of the rowing crew at Columbia University, New York. Mr. Smith has the honor of being the only new man on the Columbia crew. The remainder of the crew consists of seasoned veterans, and Smith's winning of a place is indeed remarkable, considering the fact that there were 80 candidates for the eight positions. He was the crack all-around athlete of the State University for four years, and still holds the Northwest collegiate record for the hammer-throw. Last fall he played halfback on the Columbia football eleven and recently won a number of medals in a local field day at the university.

Tracy and Merrill, the desperadoes who escaped from the Salem penitentiary after killing three guards, have thus far eluded capture, though continuous efforts have been made by sheriffs, a large posse and bloodhounds, re-inforced by two militia companies. The two convicts are crack shots and desperate. A short time after their escape they held up a couple of men near Salem and traded their striped clothes for conventional apparel that would enable them to appear in better society than they had hitherto been accustomed to. When they became hungry, they invaded farm houses and ordered meals. At the last house visited they invited the hostess to deliver to them a large chunk of bacon and a frying pan. At one time their pursuers had them surrounded, but in the darkness of night they made their escape. The numerous reports as to the whereabouts of the fugitives, most of them false, have bewildered the officers and added to the difficulty of capture. The reward has been increased to \$3,000. It is hoped Tracy and Merrill will yet be caught and thus relieve the public of two most desperate criminals.
