KLAMATH'S DAWNING DAY.

Communities, towns and cities, like certain individuals, continue the even tenor of their way for a definite period, without giving apparent surface indications of the real preparation going on, which is to constitute the foundation for the future position of importance they are destined to occupy.

Edison was a salaried telegraph operator for years while studying the mystic electric current, which he has since used successfully to write his name indelibly on the pages of human progress. Grant was a conspicuous failure for a few years after he had returned from the west, and eked out a precarious existence for himself and support for his family by hauling wood into St. Louis from his father-in-law's farm. Edison mastered the science of electricity—so far as it has been mastered—before he became a National figure and entered upon his life's work. Grant had passed, not with the highest honors, through West Point, had served in the western Indian wars and our war with Mexico, exhibiting no marked ability in any direction. But through these channels of hardship, criticism and obscurity, he laid the foundation, which enabled him to rise to the greatest opportunity of this, or perhaps any other age; and his was the master hand that preserved the Union and practically removed forever the shackles of slavery from the human race.

Referring to American cities that long waited for their well timed advent, mention might be made of Atlanta, Chattanooga, Birmingham, Denver, Seattle, and last but not least, Chicago. Some of these, like Atlanta, waited for nearly a century for the spirit of commerce and destiny to move them. Others like Birmingham, Seattle, and Chicago, were called into being by the very fundamental, economic conditions which foreordained their importance in world affairs. All alike have been, and are, the result of that subtle combination of influences and conditions which men—by lack of a better name—have christened, business or commercial cities.

It does not require a "Fellow of the Royal Society," to see that Klamath Falls, the county seat of Klamath county, is so situated as to use and be used by "business cities." Hence its future is assured, without the consent of any man, or even in the face of the protest of many men. It is nothing against its future to argue that it has not grown continuously in the past. People said the south of Atlanta, Chattanooga, St. Louis and many other cities. There comes a day when conditions are ripe for "old things to pass away" and for all things to "become new." Birmingham, Denver, Seattle and Chicago have experienced those days. These who have taken only a little care to inform themselves concerning this town and county, can see clearly by the shadows which "coming events cast before them," that our night has passed, that a larger day of commercial activity and usefulness

is actually now dawning. The grey streaks of good cheer and the illumined horizon, radiant with promise, speak in no equivocal language to those whose absorption of current events and economic ethics have given them a prescient eye.

This county contains about three and three-quarter million acres. Of this area, 2,200,000 acres are agricultural and grazing lands; 1,250,000 acres covered with fresh water lakes, rivers and marshes. The present timber supply of Klamath county is variously estimated by equally competent cruisers at from twelve to fifteen billion feet. This is mostly yellow and "silver" pine. Estimating the value of this timber in the open market at \$20 per thousand, the lumber resources of this county alone would amount to \$240,000,000! Almost every foot of this is directly tributary to the Klamath lakes, or to streams flowing into them. Upper Klamath lake reaches to within less than two miles of town and empties into Klamath river which falls 66 feet within 1 of a mile and affords opportunity to harness up electric energy equal to 25,000 horsepower at the very door of the city. This power is not only sufficient to cut Klamath's billions of feet of timber into finished products for the market. In addition electric roads could be supplied, connecting the county seat with the Keno, Merrill, Bonanza and Rly districts, as well as with Fort Klamath and the Klamath Indian Agency. This power once harnessed, various manufacturing establishments would locate here. Among these, furniture factories, woolen mills, tanneries, box factories, slaughter houses, rendering establishments, fish canneries, etc., would be the first.

Of the agricultural land in this county, (probably 1,250,000 acres all told) only about 70,000 acres are now under cultivation. This land when not under irrigation sells from \$7.00 to \$7.00 per acre. When irrigated it brings from \$20.00 to \$40.00 per acre. It produces the finest alfalfa, grasses, oats, wheat, rye and the hardier vegetables. Irrigation is coming into vogue and already there are companies in operation and in process of formation, which have asked for enough water to irrigate about 100,000 acres. This alone will mean an increase in the county's wealth of about \$3,000,000 within the next two or three years. There is no better place in Oregon for goats, sheep, cattle, hogs and horses. The mean altitude of the county is 4,200 feet above sea level. The summers are delightful, and blankets are used at night for comfort. There are boiling mineral springs within the corporate limits of Klamath Falls and through out the county, interspersed with as cold and limpid, pure water, as ever flowed. These same day will mean popular summer and health resorts, or be utilized by our local wealthy residents.

The Klamath Lake railroad is now building this way from Klamath, Calif., a point on the Southern Pacific, only 60 miles away. It will reach Pogeagama, a point only 30 miles away by Nov. 1st next. The largest and wealthiest lumber company in Oregon recently purchased what is known as the Government Military Wagon Road Grant extending through this and Eastern counties and on into Idaho. This is supposed to be the proposed route of the Coos Bay and Salt Lake railroad. It passes only a few miles east of Klamath Falls and if built will connect with the town. The purchasing company, secured every alternate section of timber for three miles on either side of the road and has since refused a million dollars cash for his bargain.

What do such transactions not speak for this county and its immediate future? Shall we continue to fold our hands and say: "the former days were better than these?" The dawning day of Klamath will soon end in a glorious sunburst. It is coming: "Notwithstanding as the daylight comes when night is done, And the crimson streak on ocean's cheek grows into the sun, Notwithstanding as springtime her crown of verdure weaves, And all the trees on all the hills put forth their million leaves."

DEACON DUFFY TELLS ABOUT ODESSA.

Deacon Duffy tells a few of the many things of interest to be seen at Odessa in the following communication: "The proprietor, Mr. Griffith, has been making great improvements at his resort. Last year he made a wonderful strike in strawberry culture. He grafted the strawberry on the milkweed plant, which produced delicious strawberries and cream. But they lacked sugar. So this season he has re-grafted on the sugar maple, which produces most delightful strawberries, cream and sugar. They are very large. One will fill an ordinary coffee cup and three of them are as many as one person would care to eat.

"When you go to Odessa don't fail to stop over night. You will be delighted with what you see. Mr. Griffith has a great many flocks of bees. One of the belle queen bees was seen flitting with one of the chief tyces of the fire bugs. In a few months there were millions of lantern bees flying all over the country at night with their little lanterns, gathering honey. Around the house the light is as light as day. You can see to read very small print. Put six or eight of them in a bottle and they will light a large room. They are the cheapest and best light known to science. By actual test each lantern or fire bee has a lighting capacity of one candle power, and they gather more than twice as much honey as the old style bee. Of course the reason is that they can work at night while it is cool."
