### KLAMATH RAILROAD.

(Ashland Tidings.)

While work on the construction of the Klamath Lake Railroad from Lairds on the S. P. Co's line to Pokegama is going steadily forward its progress is being retarded somewhat by a lack of laborers. Railroad laborers like all other kinds of workers during this era of prosperity are difficult to obtain. The promoters of the enterprise have had considerable difficulty ever since work started in securing sufficient men to do the work laid out. Grading has been finished as far as the point on the Klamath river, below Fall Creek, where a steel bridge has been thrown across the stream, and steel rails have been laid a distance of twelve miles from Lairds or within nearly two miles of the bridge. Considering the difficulties encountered in securing sufficient labor fairly good progress has been made. Owing to some changes in the route since the original plans were drawn a new survey has been made and by it the railroad will approach the tableland opposite Shovel creek by quite an easy grade. This new survey will take the route close to the waterfall of Fall creek, where the water of that stream takes a tumble of one hundred and fifty feet. It also taps a splendid body of timber land in that vicinity.

A week ago Wednesday he was on top of the Pelican Bay lodge making some repairs on the roof. For some cause he lost his balance and fell to the ground, sustaining some painful injuries to his left leg. Aside from dispensing justice at the town of Crystal, the judge employs his leisure time as a hunter and guide, in which lines he has more than a local reputation. Having to temporarily suspend his roof repairing operations at the lodge, he mounted his pony and with a pack horse in the rear, started out to do a little hunting. After traveling a distance of a mile or two, his saddle became loose and he dismounted to cinch it up. While thus engaged, the saddle horse kicked him over against the pack horse, and the latter not to be outdone

ping-ponged him with a well directed kick to the point from which he had started. The first kick disabled one of Silvers' legs and the second one made a painful fracture of the other one, and it was all the judge could do to retrace his way home.
