King Edward was duly crowned last Saturday amidst the usual splendor and ceremony deemed necessary on such occasions. The result of the coronation on the King's health was anticipated with uncertainty and fear, but he survived the ordeal in good condition.

The West can well be thankful that Harry Tracy, the escaped convict, murderer and desperado, has at last been driven to his death. His checked career, filled with crime, and closing with a spectacular exhibition of lawlessness, punctuated with murder, has come to an end none too soon to satisfy the interests of law, order and good society. Tracy was forced to take flight from a farm, where he had been an unwelcome guest for several days, and committed suicide rather than die at the hands of the determined posse which was in hot pursuit. After his escape from the Salem penitentiary, his trail led north to Seattle and then east across the Cascades in Washington, his intended destination having been the "Hole-in-the-Ground," Wyoming's notorious place of refuge for criminals and desperados. But his plans failed and he yielded to superior numbers near Cranston, Washington. The rewards offered by the authorities of Oregon and Washington, will be paid promptly to those entitled to them. But the general public is not so much interested in the distribution of the rewards, as in the fact that in the death of Merrill, followed by that of Tracy, the world has lately become rid of two most dangerous and desperate characters.

### EVIL OF LONG SERMONS.

Ordinarily the REPUBLICAN confines its preaching to the concrete and practical side of life, but a heart to heart talk with our brethren of the cloth seems now to be in order.

Outside of the work of constantly revising their creeds, they, as a class, do not give the world those examples of real progress and adaptation to modern requirements, which their well-wishers, and philanthropists generally, have so long hoped for them, and explained that they would do. One relic of a past age, which clings to the urban preacher with discouraging tenacity, is his futile persistency in inflicting long, windy dissertations upon the unhappy few, who constitute his congregation—varying perhaps with each succeeding Sunday.

"Man wants but little here below, nor wants that little long," is especially applicable to the average modern sermon. This is but another instance of the inefficiency of good intentions. Brother Blank means well enough. He has "the hell fire and damnation" theory pat enough; and amidst the death of ideas and a plethora of words, he works himself up to the belief that the respectful attention of his helpless auditors, is actual interest in his unsubstantiated theories. He gives them sound for sense, wind for logic, opinions for facts and presumption for consolation. He consumes five times as much time in telling them what he does not know, as would be necessary to impart certain helpful facts, susceptible of practical utilization in this busy life of our work-a-day world.

The dry-rot of religious apathy, the wall of ungodliness emanating from the pulpit against the people, the "failure of the church" as alleged in various localities, and all the concomitants that go in the pestilist's train of forebodings and evil prophecies, would disappear from our speech and literature, if we could secure and maintain an urban ministry equal to the logical demand of the times. A "good" lawyer one hundred years ago, would not now, if he should come back to earth, be retained as a clerk by some of our successful law firms. The farmer who would attempt methods a century old, would starve, in this competitive age. The scientist even of half a century ago would be at the foot of the class in technical and scientific knowledge of today.

Why then does the ministry not descend from the ethereal to the terrestrial? Instead of theorizing about Life's final denouement, would it not be wise, practical, humane, to qualify, to teach the living how to live, how to be honest with their fellows and still be successful; how to be cleanly, healthy, contented and useful? If the great gospel power cannot deal with men and make them better, it is a failure. If our preachers persist in covering up the real spirit of its teachings, they are failures and a great detriment to humanity.

### TIMBER LAND LOCATORS.

Timber land locators are still swarming into Southern Oregon, and they are coming from all quarters, too. Saturday a party of prominent men from the vicinity of Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, arrived in Ashland and left today by private conveyance for Big in Klamath county, in the vicinity of which they propose to file on timber claims in the extensive yellow pine belt.
