### PORTLAND ELKS' CARNIVAL.

The Portland Elks' Carnival in the metropolis of the Willamette, September 1 to 13, will be a stupendous street exposition on a scale this year larger than any other city in the West has ever seen. The great feature will be the Jabour Oriental Circus and Menagerie Company, which comes fresh from New York at one jump. In the German village a continuous vaudeville performance will be given, 30 artists appearing. These include the Sigmento troupe of Japanese head and foot balancers and acrobats, Halder,

the Juggler; Mile Zora, the wire walker; the Carlons, in an acrobatic sketch; Professor Donar, a card and coin manipulator; the Middleton marionettes, in new business; the Pfell trio of Tyrolean warblers; Streets of Cairo, with native Arabs, camels and donkeys; a troupe of marmeluke Arabian acrobats, whirling Dervishes, gun spinners, headed by Hedji-el-Chariff, who was brought to this country by Barnum; Hindoo fakiers, Russian fire-eaters and sword swallows, a Mexican village, with seven lady singers and dancers, with an incidental imitation bullfight; a menagerie of 50 animals, Katool's trained leopards, two sensational acts in a lion's cage, a performing elephant and a bear that has mastered the alluring intricacies of the hoochie-coochie.
