KLAMATH LAKE RAILROAD.

(Ashland Tidings.)

Hervey Lindley, who is promoting the construction of the new railroad between Lairds, on the S. P. Co.'s line, and Pokegama, Oregon, while in Ashland this week reported excellent progress in building operations. The road is now built to a point 12 miles from Klamathon, and the grade is done and the rails laid up the side of a mountain, which brings the construction work to a level plateau, and within a short distance of the body of timber, to tap which, is one of the principal objects of building the road. Only three and one-half miles remain to traverse to reach this body of timber and as the ground is level, progress will be more rapid. In fact the heaviest grades have been surmounted and the difficult part of the building is now completed; including construction of all the bridges and

trestles, and it will be but a short time before the line is open for business. The number of men now at work on the road is 350. In regard to the rumor that the road had been sold, Mr. Lindley said there was no truth in it, and that there was no intention of a sale in the future.

PORTLAND PARTY AT CRATER LAKE.

Will G. Steel, who managed the excursion from Portland to Crater Lake, sent the following communication, written at the lake, to the Portland Oregonian:

Friday morning we left Eagle Point at 7 o'clock and spent several hours at J. H. Stewart's new summer home, 24 miles distant, where we were royally entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Stewart, who served an elegant feast and showed us over their beautiful summer retreat. Our attention was called to the fact that neither flies, mosquitoes or other insects infected the place. During our stay we saw no flies and took it for granted that there were no similar pesky little things. The night was spent on the right bank of Rogue river, at the foot of Flounce Rock hill, in a beautiful spot, overlooking Rogue river. It had been planned to take another day and spend the night at Prospect bridge, but as Governor Geer was anxious to return to Salem, we pushed on, giving up the idea of illuminating Rogue river falls. Time became precious and we hurried on to Crater Lake, where we arrived at 2 p. m. yesterday. But few campers were found in the vicinity, but several parties have since arrived. Professor Coville has not yet arrived but is reported as approaching, and is momentarily expected. We have secured the boats and our entire party is now visiting Wizard island and other points of interest.

We have had two very excellent

camp-fire talks, and interest in them is on the increase. Governor Geer addressed us one evening on the manner of managing the state prison, and the general character of its construction and gave a detailed and intensely interesting account of Tracy and Merrill's escape. Last evening Mr. Tongue spoke at length on the character and life of President McKinley. We continue to have splendid weather and the best time to be had any where. It is now impossible to say exactly when we will leave Crater Lake, but it will probably be about Thursday or Friday. Governor Geer leaves immediately for Salem and will kindly act as postman.
