Thirty-one states will elect congressmen in November and from reports there is every assurance that the result will make the next house overwhelmingly republican. There is too much prosperity for democrats to elect many of them.

The excellent speech of Congressman Tongue on good roads has attracted considerable favorable attention in the East. The New York Tribune published it September 10, and since then our worthy representative was invited to give another address on the same subject at Pontiac, Mich., September 22.

The refusal of Speaker Henderson to become a candidate for congress, because he does not agree with the party platform adopted by his constituents, will not blinder the success of the republican party in his state or elsewhere. That part of the platform which he declines to accept refers to a removal of the tariff where it shelters trusts. The result is that another republican will be elected in his place and another republican will be chosen speaker of the house.

The following interesting figures are taken from the abstract of votes cast for state officers at the June election: Total votes received: For governor—George E. Chamberlain, democrat, 41,857; William J. Furnish, republican, 41,681. For United States senator—T. T. Geer, republican, 44,697; O. E. S. Wood, democrat, 32,627. For secretary of state—Frank L. Dunbar, republican, 47,623; D. W. Sears, democrat, 30,557. For state treasurer—Charles S. Moore, republican, 47,418; Henry Buckman, democrat, 30,506. Majorities: Chamberlain, 276; Geer, 12,070; Dunbar, 17,066; Moore, 15,912. Average republican vote of the state on six candidates, excepting governor, 46,505. Average democratic vote, 31,492.

The latter part of last week President Roosevelt began his trip to the Middle West. He spoke before a multitude of people at the Cincinnati Fall Festival last Saturday, dealing mainly with the question of trusts. Following is a brief extract from his address on that subject: "Since the states cannot work along the same lines, I believe the best of grounds exist for a constitutional amendment for national control of large corporations."

REPRESENTATIVE TONGUE ON TARIFF REFORM.

(Sunday Oregonian.)

Representative Tongue, who has just returned from the State Fair, when asked today to state his views in reference to the refusal of Speaker Henderson to become a candidate for Congress, said:

"Personally, I regret the action of Mr. Henderson very much indeed. He is a very able man, a wise counselor, a safe leader and has a strong, magnetic personality. As a presiding officer he has given great satisfaction to both sides of the house. In sentiments and principle he is largely a Western man, being very friendly to the Western portion of the United States. The loss of his service is a national misfortune."

"I regret to see the disposition to abuse him by people who do not agree with him. He is a conscientious man, clean and patriotic. If he really believes that he could not properly represent the convictions of the people of his district, there was nothing for him to do but to decline to be their representative. From the dispatches, however, I am not able to see that the differences were so great. The Iowa platform admits where the tariff shelters monopoly it should be removed. This is good republicanism. I do not understand that Speaker Henderson disagrees with this declaration of principles. The issue between him and some of his constituents seems to be one of fact—whether there are tariff schedules that shelter trusts. That can be settled on careful examination. It might be true today. It might not be true when the next Congress meets. Conditions constantly change."

"Speaker Henderson thinks there are no schedules of the Dingley law that should be changed. Now, there are a great many republicans who do not agree with him on this point. Strong indications are that some of these schedules could well be changed with beneficial result to the American people. My own views upon this question were fairly well expressed over a year ago in a letter to the American Economist. They were expressed again in a letter to Mr. Babcock last spring, which was made public through the press. I said then in substance that where tariffs upon productions are not needed for either revenue or protection, where the industries producing these goods are capable of withstanding all foreign competition, are outstripping all foreign competitors in their own domain and rapidly capturing the markets of the world, and the tariffs serve no purpose but enabling the corporations controlling the productions to extort unreasonable prices from the home consumer, while selling cheaper abroad than this, tariffs should be repealed at once. This should be done not to destroy but to save protection. Such tariffs are the

enemies not the friend of protection, I expressed the opinion then and entertain it now that unless the republican party does remove such tariffs within a reasonable time, wherever they exist, and where the indications are that they are permanent, both republican success and the protective system will be endangered."

"As to the effect of Speaker Henderson's action upon the republican party, I think there is a great deal of exaggeration. It is scarcely possible that the democratic party is going to make an issue of the resignation of Speaker Henderson. He has withdrawn himself from being an issue. On the other hand, his withdrawal will rob the democratic party of a very large portion of its political ammunition. His withdrawal is a recognition of the fact that tariff reform will be carried on within the republican party itself. It will have a tendency to retain within the party that class of men, largely gold-standard democrats, who are restless under some of the provisions of the Dingley bill, but who are willing to abide with the republican party if there is to be a tariff reform within a reasonable time by that organization."

"Referring to the above, the Oregonian has the following editorial strongly endorsing Mr. Tongue's remarks: 'Elsewhere in today's paper appears a masterly discussion of Speaker Henderson's resignation and announcement from Representative Tongue of the First Oregon District. His assertions are impregnable and his reasoning cannot be answered. Mr. Tongue has already put himself on record as a sound and consistent tariff reformer in the interest of justice, of the protective principle itself, and of the republican party, for a letter embodying these views was printed last year in the organ of the American Protective Tariff League. Mr. Tongue's clear vision and resolute stand upon this issue give Oregon just such an admirable representation in congress on the tariff question as senator Dolph gave us on the money question. Again, let us say, Mr. Tongue's position is beyond the possibility of successful attack.'"
