The National Encampment of the G. A. R. will be held in Washington, D. C., on the 15th and 16th of the next year in San Francisco, Cal.

Unfiled State Senator John H. Mitchell, who returned from Honolulu a few days ago, will in Ashland Saturday en route to Portland.

The senator says the trip was a strictly business one connected with the senate committee on which Senators Foster of Washington and Burford of Kansas were associated with him. Their report will be submitted to the senate committee on Pacific Islands and Porto Rico.

According to a reliable statement issued by the coal miners, who are now on a strike, they have not been receiving in wages more than an average of \$300 per year. They have been compelled to work for little pay per ton and then claim to have been cheated in weights. They wish to share in the era of universal prosperity, but with high prices for food and commodities, they have been barely able to obtain the necessities.

The coal operators, of whom a supercilious composition denominated President Baer appears to be the most conspicuous and contemptible, still remain obdurate and unyielding, notwithstanding the growing distress of the public. They are law-breakers themselves, and still complain that the law is not properly enforced to maintain order and protect their property. They demand tolerance of their combinations, but scorn the idea of recognizing the labor unions. The coal operators are moulding public opinion against themselves and have much to fear from their attitude of insolence and cold-blooded indifference to the general welfare which they would destroy rather than swerve from their positions as absolute dictators.
