

LOCAL NEWS.

Yesterday Maj. Worden sold two lots in Euwana Heights to Robert B. Jones.

Mr. Jones will this week begin laying the stone for A. Castel's new brewery.

The lodge of Eastern Star had initiation ceremonies and a banquet Tuesday night.

The county commissioners' court will be in session next week, beginning Wednesday.

The regular fall term of circuit court for this county opens here Monday, November 10.

The frosts of the last few nights emphasize the necessity of haste in gathering the apple crop.

Sheriff Summers started out Monday morning to summon jurors for the coming term of circuit court.

Last week the Olene Live Stock Co. leased 2,400 sheep to Jas. Stoby and 2,300 sheep to Brown Bros.

A company has been incorporated in Lake county to build a telephone line from Lakeview to New Pine Creek.

Miss Gertrude Butler, aged 29 years, died at Salem last Friday of blood poisoning caused by the bite of a spider.

Henry Jensen has bought of the Heidrich family twenty feet on Main street, consideration being \$15 per foot.

Jackson county held its annual teachers' institute at Medford last week, beginning Thursday and closing Saturday.

A band of 200 fat cattle belonging to G. H. Meiss of Montague passed through Klamath Falls yesterday morning en route to the railroad.

The Grants Pass board of trade has decided to spend several hundred dollars in preparing descriptive pamphlets advertising Josephine county.

A. C. Lewis will shortly begin the erection of a new building on his lots recently purchased of A. L. Leavitt. When completed, the building will be occupied by a meat market.

The Grants Pass Observer thinks the Josephine county jail is in an abominable condition and unfit for occupancy. Its lack of sanitary regulation seems to be the cause of attack.

Lakeview is enjoying a lively growth and making numerous substantial improvements. The Examiner says two new brick and at least a dozen frame buildings are now in course of construction.

The telephone line has been completed from Klamath Falls to Merrill and several intermediate ranches have secured connections. The company's workmen are now engaged in extending the line to Bonanza.

J. F. Goeller's new house in West Klamath Falls is now being enclosed and is progressing toward completion as rapidly as possible. When finished it will be one of the largest and neatest residences in the county.

The county clerk's office receives a number of rabbit scalps each week, but not nearly so many as formerly. The rabbit resource of the county is evidently being greatly diminished, much to the satisfaction of ranchers.

Leong Oek, a Chinaman, has been convicted of murder in the first degree in the superior court of Siskiyou county and will be sent to San Quentin to be hanged. He murdered another Chinaman at Happy Camp last Spring.

It is understood that there are only eighty acres in the tract of land, a part of the old Ft. Klamath military reserve, to be appraised by Messrs. Applegate, Emmitt and Langell. The land is described as E 1/4 of SW 1/4, Sec. 22, Twp. 33, S., R. 7 E.

We understand that Maj. Worden has sold an undivided half interest in fifteen acres of the Cronch farm to parties from the east, who will co-operate with him in plating the tract and supplying it with water. The land abjoins Nichols addition to Klamath Falls.

There is a shortage of the wood supply in Ashland and prices have gone up. The Tidings thinks wood dealers have been too busy with other employment during the past summer to provide the usual quantity and as a result the town is threatened with a fuel famine.

The Ashland Town Talk reports that on the 12th inst. the 4-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Shivar of Fall Creek was fatally burned while playing with matches. The child was taken to Klamath for medical treatment and died there the next day.

Some Medford hunters returned home last week after spending a fortnight shooting bears and deer in Blue Canyon, north of Mount Pitt. They report that there are twenty or more lakes in that vicinity and

were delighted with the fine scenery and the abundance of game and fish. Attorney C. C. Brower who arrived last Thursday on his return from a several weeks' sojourn at his former home in Astoria, reports that there is much inquiry in Clatsop county about this region and believes there is bright prospect for a considerable addition to our population from that section.

Eva Lewis, for twenty-six years a resident of Lake county, died in the insane asylum at Salem on Monday of last week. He had been committed to that institution from Lakeview only a few weeks ago. He leaves a wife and two children at Lakeview, to which place his remains were conveyed for interment.

The case of C. E. Dutro vs. J. A. McIntire, an action to recover money, occupied the attention of Judge Baldwin and a jury for several days of the past week, being concluded on Monday when a verdict was rendered in favor of the defendant. We are informed that the case will be appealed to the circuit court.

In the circuit court at Lakeview last week a motion for a change of venue was granted in the case of Lake county vs. the bondsmen of A. J. Nelson, the alleged defaulting sheriff of that county. This is a civil action to recover the amount of the alleged defalcation. The case will probably be transferred to Jackson county.

We are informed that the motion for a new trial in the case against A. J. Nelson, under conviction for misappropriation of funds while sheriff of Lake county, was denied in the circuit court at Lakeview last week and the defendant was sentenced to four years in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$6,000. The case will probably be appealed to the supreme court.

A deal was closed Monday whereby the Klamath Falls Express changed hands, J. G. Pierce selling the property to Roy Hamaker. Mr. Hamaker has been connected with the paper for several years and is a young man of energy and ability in the printing line. We understand the services of C. S. Graves will be retained, and that the paper politically will be independent.

Ashland Tidings: A serious accident is reported to have occurred Tuesday on the Klamath Falls stage road at a point near Shake. A falling tree came down across the road just as a wagon with a half dozen timber land prospectors were passing along. Three of the occupants of the wagon were seriously injured and the vehicle wrecked. The injured people were taken to Shoal Creek Springs to be cared for.

We understand there is prospect of a change in the schedule on the Ashland-Klamath Falls stage line, to take effect in the near future. Under the proposed new arrangement there will be no stop over night on the mountains, the stage leaving Ashland early in the morning and arriving here some time the following night. This change will expedite the mail considerably in advance of what it is now.

Here is what Walter Camp, the great football critic, says of the football skill of R. S. Smith of Klamath Falls, who is plying with the Columbia team: "Weekes and Smith as a pair of backs ought to be the equals of any two men on any team this season. Weekes can make end runs to perfection, and Smith can strike across the tackle position with as great severity as any man in the back field of any team last or this year."

Constable J. N. White of Dunsuir, Calif., was found dead on Saturday at that place in a ditch which serves the Electric Light Co. with power, and the condition of the body points to murder which it is thought may have been committed the night before by tramps while the town was on his way home. The officer has been infested with an unusual number of tramps of late and White had been active in an endeavor to get rid of them.

Yesterday C. A. Bunting consummated a deal for the purchase of 300 acres of land and improvements of S. C. Trayner, the property being situated in Tule lake precinct. The consideration was \$12,000. Mr. Bunting also has a large tract of land in the Sprague river section, which, with his recent purchase, will yield feed for his growing herds of cattle. He is one of the progressive stock men of the county and is reaping the reward of industry and good management.

Complaint is made that two departments of the school—those of Mrs. Cogswell and Miss Gill—have more pupils than can be well cared for. If such is the condition, the teachers are unduly overtaxed and the children can not receive the full benefits of the school, which they need and could otherwise have. Some way should be found to reduce the number of pupils in the crowded rooms, even if it is necessary to employ another teacher. This ought to

be done in the interest of health and to facilitate proper training and education. The arbitration commission, appointed by the president to settle differences between mine owners and their striking employes, has organized and undertaken the work given into its hands. Soon results will be reached and a report made, by which both sides to the contest have agreed to peacefully abide. In the meantime miners are returning to work and consumers of coal are being supplied as rapidly as possible.
