### SUSPENSION OF TIMBER ENTRIES.

Last week Secretary Hitchcock of the Interior Department issued an order that all entries under the timber and stone act in the Roseburg, Lakeview and Dalles land districts should be suspended, pending an investigation, and directed, according to the Oregonian, that each timber entryman be served with a notice to show cause why his entry should not be canceled. This action is said to have grown from evidence of violation of the law, under which the lands have been taken. Whether this step by Secretary Hitchcock will temporarily prevent new entries for timber or merely delay the issuance of patents, to give time for investigation, we have been unable to learn. While it is proper to arrest any system of fraud and detect and punish the perpetrators, it seems unfortunate that it couldn't have been done without causing annoyance to many innocent people who have taken advantage of the law only because it enabled them to acquire good timber land cheap, believing it to be a desirable investment in view of the rapid diminution of eastern forests.

The Oregonian reports that discovery of violations of the law will act as an inducement to the secretary to urge upon congress the necessity for the repeal of the timber and stone act. Is this the only land law that is violated? If not, why single out this particular one for repeal? As we understand, the intention of the act is to distribute among the people generally the benefits of the government timber. Is there any law that will come as near serving that purpose as the timber and stone act.

Repeat that law and the common people can obtain no direct benefit from the timber. Instead, it would be better to restrict the use of government scrip, with which capitalists can swallow up large bodies of timber with benefit to no one but themselves.
