LOCAL NEWS.

Lakeview held its annual city election Tuesday.

The commissioners' court began its regular session yesterday.

F. P. Grohs, proprietor of the Rim Rock ranch near Bonanza, is reported very ill.

Another car load of Greek laborers arrived at Laird last week to work on the Klamath railroad.

Numerous loads of wheat have been brought to town and sold to the local mill this week.

E. V. Carter, state senator from Jackson county, is being mentioned for president of the senate.

Josephine county has strawberry beds from which a second crop of fruit is now being gathered.

President Roosevelt has issued his proclamation designating Thursday, November 27, as Thanksgiving day.

J. W. Brandenburg is around again after a spell of sickness caused by running a rusty nail into his left hand.

Geo. Blehn has sold a half interest in his feed stable to Fred Buesing of Spring Lake, consideration being \$1,015.

Wm. Terrill has bought the saloon property of Roy Kilgore at Bonanza and expects to engage in business there.

Rev. J. R. Griffith will conduct Baptist services in the M. E. church at this place next Sunday morning at 11 o'clock.

Flaekus Bros. have this week commenced repairing the bridge at Bonanza. It will require about a month to complete the work.

The Examiner reports that Moore's Comedians, who exhibited in Lakeview recently, will probably return there to spend the winter.

Mr. and Mrs. Geo. W. Bradley have this week commenced house-keeping in the new residence of J. M. Moore on Ewauna Heights.

While hunting for bear in Josephine county recently Chas. Chaney mistook his son-in-law, Samuel Block, for a bear and shot and killed him.

Monday's Tidings reports that the heirs of several deceased nephews of the late Henry Amerman have begun legal proceedings to get shares of his estate.

The replevin case, growing out of the Ashland-Klamath Falls stage line difficulty, came up for hearing before Judge Baldwin Tuesday and was continued until Saturday.

The telephone line is now completed to the Horton ranch on its way to Bonanza. It is expected that a branch will leave the main line two or three miles west of Bonanza and run to Dairy via the ranch of Shook Bros.

C. S. Hamaker closed a deal Tuesday for the sale of his hotel property at Bonanza to Mrs. E. L. Terwilliger of Ashland, consideration being \$1,000. Mr. Hamaker, and family will this week remove to Ashland where he expects to run a feed stable.

D. E. Risedorf who arrived recently, accompanied by his wife, from Lovelocks, Nevada, has decided to locate at this place and engage in running a delivery wagon. He has had plenty of experience in the business and ought to doubtless will do well here.

H. H. Van Valkenburg and John Cabler returned Thursday from their week's hunting trip in the Langell valley section and brought back five deer as proof of their skill as marksmen. Mr. Van Valkenburg generously distributed quantities of venison among his friends.

Judge W. C. Hale, formerly of this place, now of Grants Pass, has filed with the city auditor of Portland a claim for \$100 damages against the city for injuries sustained by a fall into an excavation which was not guarded by danger lights. Judge Hale says he has placed the claim low to avoid litigation.

The town board had its regular meeting Monday evening. The only business of importance receiving attention, aside from allowing claims, was the employment of an attorney to take legal steps, if necessary, to compel the ditch company to keep its canal from leaking and running water on the streets of the town. H. W. Keese was employed.

The county judge's office in the court house has been fitted up in elegant style and ought to be an inspiration to those who have business in that court.

Beautifully tinted paper adorns the walls and a fine velvet carpet on the floor forces the propriety of expectorating in the several metallic cuspidors. The judge's quarters are now neat and comfortable, as they should be.

Ashland Tidings: Increased vigor is noticed in the progress of construction of the railroad up the Klamath river from Laird station on

the S. P. Co's line. A couple of hundred extra men have been put to work during the past week and the construction crews will soon be laboring on Oregon soil. Materials have arrived for the construction of buildings at Laird station and it is expected that within a short time operations will begin on the erection of the big mill that the concern proposes to have in connection with the railroad enterprise.

The total stand of timber in the Cascade forest reserve, according to a late examination by representatives of the Geological Survey, slightly exceeds 50,000,000,000 feet. The total area of the reserve, 4,383,588 acres, is classified as follows: Forested, 4,161,264 acres; burnt, 377,171 acres; open, 266,746 acres; logged, 5589 acres; cultivated 630 acres; water surface, 27,568 acres; glaciers and barren, 44,120 acres.

Ex-President Grover Cleveland who dropped into political innocuous desuetude at the close of his hard-time administration, has lately revived, making his appearance on the stump in behalf of old-line democracy last week in New Jersey. His reappearance in the political arena suggests that if the different factions of the party cannot agree on a candidate for the presidency, he may be able to win the nomination.

The Medford Success is a new semi-weekly paper established at Medford with Charles Meserve as editor and P. M. Kershaw as business manager. Its initial number was issued last Friday, being a four-column paper with six pages. It is well filled with neatly arranged and printed reading matter, and we wish the promoters the success that all newspaper men deserve. With four papers, Medford is not apt to suffer for want of sufficient publicity.

The sheet and pillow case dance at the opera house Friday night was a genuine success. About forty couples were present and with excellent music the time passed quickly and pleasantly. Credit is due the ladies for appearing in large numbers in the prescribed costumes, thus contributing much to the success of the occasion. A unique and interesting feature was the appearance of a phalanx of twenty ladies, arrayed in white and carrying jack-lanterns.

Medford Mail: Louis Knips, of this place, and James and W. S. Mathias and Jas. F. Adamson, of St. Paul, Minn., returned Sunday from a trip into Klamath county, where they located upon timber land. They were away thirteen days and during their pilgrimage made a visit to Crater lake. They found the snow a foot and a half deep there, but the clouds cleared away and gave them a good view of the lake—and the customers were wild with admiration.

Observance of Halloween here Friday night by some, as evidenced Saturday morning, was not exactly in accordance with the custom in vogue when Burns wrote his celebrated poem, entitled "Halloween." But in this age custom allows license for a moderate degree of devilment for that occasion and if property is not seriously damaged, the result is regarded with good nature. P. B. Whitney, a Southern Pacific employe at Ashland, has received the munificent sum of \$10.75 as an inheritance that comes to him as an heir of one of the Americans who were concerned in the French spoliation claims. The report says that Whitney is the great-great-grandson of one Robert Pattern, a Yankee trader, who, in the latter part of the 18th century, owned a schooner named the Orange, which plied between the Connecticut

coast and the West Indies. During these troublesome times the vessel was captured by a Privateer, and some merchandise belonging to Pattern taken. Now, after 104 years, damages for the goods are distributed among 110 heirs, and Whitney's share amounts to \$10.74, which sum has been paid by the French government.

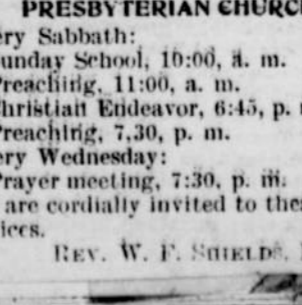
