President Roosevelt has gone on a bear hunt. He ought to be well fitted for such pursuit after his successful wrestle with the coal barons.

Governor T. T. Geer has announced his refusal to call a special session of the legislature and gives his reasons for so deciding, being in short, "that the needs of the state can well wait until the regular session."

Testimony is being taken by the commission, appointed by President Roosevelt to adjust differences between employers and employees in the anthracite coal fields, and the result will be known before long.

Next Thursday has been designated as the annual Thanksgiving day, the primary purpose of which is to reflect and give expression of gratitude for divine favor during the past year. As a nation and as individuals, there is much for which we may well be thankful. Plenty and prosperity have prevailed everywhere and the future abounds with bright prospects. In taking a retrospective view we might find fuel for regret, but it should be crowded out of consideration by the many blessings that deserve our joyful appreciation and gratitude.

COMPLIMENTS THE KLAMATHS.
As a result of some Klamath Indians visiting Medford recently, the Mail of that place makes the following complimentary reference:
"By the way, there is quite a contrast between those Indians who were here last week and the blanketed savage of 40 or even 50 years ago. These people are dressed comfortably and in the main cleanly, they drive good teams and have good vehicles, have money to purchase the goods they want and understand the value thereof, and while here conducted themselves in an unostentatious and dignified manner. The Klamaths are now practically self-supporting, one of the very few western tribes which have reached that point in their civilization."

PRE-HISTORIC RELIC.

Last Monday politics was for a time laid aside and public interest concentrated on a remarkable find by Alex Coffey. Mr. Coffey was cutting rock to be used in building a fire proof vault for Mr. Baker when he dug out a piece of glass-like substance that had evidently been fashioned by the hand of man. To all appearances it was the lid of an urn, beautifully cut and about four inches in diameter. The stone from which it was cut was of a soft volcanic formation. The lid, the only part found, was badly shattered from a blow of the axe, but was put together and little doubt remains that it was used by some pre-historic race which lived contemporaneously with the mastodon, elephant, giraffe and other tropical animals whose fossils remain scattered over this country.

RECENT IMMIGRATION.
(Ashland Tidings.)
According to the returns compiled by the passenger department of the Southern Pacific Company, the number of settlers who came west on the cheap colonist rates that were in effect from September 1st to November 6th greatly exceeded the expectations of the companies that shared in the handling of the traffic. By way of Ogden there were 16,368 settlers and 796 second-class passengers, who came to the coast during the period mentioned. By way of El Paso there were 6,908 settlers and 578 second-class passengers, and by way of Los Angeles there were eighty-five settlers. These figures give a total of 22,761 settlers and 1,374 second-class passengers, or a grand total of 24,135 people, a large percentage of whom will remain to establish permanent homes on the Coast by way of the Southern Pacific Co.'s line entering California.
