HISTORIC HONESTY.

How a Negro Charwoman Guarded a Treasury Package Containing Thousands of Dollars.

"The most notable exhibition of honesty within the history of the treasury department," says a writer in Ladies' Home Journal, "was made by Sophie Holmes, a colored woman first employed 40 years ago by Gen. Spinner—then treasurer of the United States—as a temporary charwoman. One afternoon in April, 1862, while sweeping and scrubbing the floor of the issue division she found a package full of crisp thousand dollar notes, which some careless clerk had neglected to return to the safe. She determined to stand guard over the treasure and to confide her secret to no one but Gen. Spinner himself, who slept in the treasury building during those troublesome war times. She swept the dust of the room into one pile, then another; scattered it about and swept it up again and again, doing thus to keep up the appearance of industry and to make the atmosphere of the room as uninviting as possible to the intruding guards, who now and then sauntered in. From sheer weakness she finally fell asleep until past midnight, when, imagining she discerned a figure moving in the room, she groped her way to the valuable bundle, secreted it between two desks, sat upon it, and while continuing her vigil thus fell asleep again. About four o'clock in the morning she was awakened by Gen. Spinner's footsteps. Although she gave the treasurer a great fright he rewarded her with a life appointment as matron in the issue division. And he did justly. When the package was examined it was found to contain, some say, \$30,000; others, \$700,000."

GIANTS CAN BE GROWN.

With Proper Food and Exercise the Growth of Man May Be Accelerated.

The common notion of the physiologist that growth and development are due to suitable diet and exercise has formed the subject of some peculiar experiments on the part of a French doctor. He claims that he has abnormally accelerated the growth of children and animals by feeding them on a preparation of cereals, and that he can make giants of those whose organization in any way permits of such extension.

A certain Bishop Berkeley succeeded in a similar feat long ago. He took a male child and fed him in accordance with a system of his own. By the time the boy was 16 years of age he had attained a height of a feet 6 inches.
