## WOOLGROWERS ASSOCIATION ELIMINATED

### Longer to Control the Allotment of Grazing on Forest Reserves.

The following decision of the Honorable Secretary of the Interior, has been furnished this paper for publication by S. C. Bartrum, Forest Supervisor:

The application for the privilege of grazing sheep on forest reserves has been handled in two ways:

(a) Where a woolgrowers' association exists which includes a majority of the persons who are interested in the use of the reserve, the association may allot the range and sheep among the applicants. (b) Where such an association does not exist, or does not care to assume the responsibility, all applications are made to the supervisor direct, who acts upon and forwards the same to the Hon. Commissioner of the General Land Office, with his approval or other recommendation. The said rules were established by the Honorable Secretary of the Interior, by order of February 8, 1902.

On October 24, 1902, the Honorable Secretary of the Interior decided that in the future the "woolgrowers' association" will be eliminated from the matter of allotment or sheep control, and that the grazing be placed directly in the hands of the supervisors, under existing rules, and that all penalties and obligations imposed by departmental order of February 9, 1902, remain in force against all permit holders. And all applications should be submitted to the supervisors direct.
