TO PAY THE KLAMATH INDIANS.

Washington dispatch to Saturday's  
Oregonian: Representative Moody to-  
day appeared before the Senate In-  
dian committee and urged the adop-  
tion of Senator Mitchell's proposed  
amendments to the Indian bill, laying  
particular stress on the proposition to  
incorporate in the bill a provision for  
the ratification of the treaty with the  
Klamath Indians looking to the relin-  
quishment to the Government of a  
part of their lands, for which they  
are to be paid something over  
\$500,000. Owing to the continued  
illness of Senator Mitchell, it has de-  
veloped upon Mr. Moody to look after  
this and all other Oregon legislation.
