President Roosevelt is preparing to soon take a trip to the Yellowstone Park and the Pacific Coast.

Wm. J. Bryan is still active, his latest advice being to urge the democrats to stick to the Kansas City platform. Bryan has just enough influence left to facilitate the defeat of the democratic party.

Senator Fulton has been duly sworn in as one of the U. S. senators from Oregon and is participating in the extra session of the senate. Senators Mitchell and Fulton are a strong team and will pull together for the best interests of Oregon.

The bill before the Minnesota legislature to regulate kissing provides that no one shall indulge in that exercise if affected with a weak heart or a contagious or infectious disease. It is usually the one with a weak heart who does the most kissing.

Representative Williamson has been getting acquainted with Washington the last few weeks, and among other things finding suitable quarters for himself and family during the session next winter. He says he can secure accommodations at a hotel for \$400 per month, but is puzzled to know what he could do with the rest of his salary.

On the 4th inst., Governor Chamberlain issued a writ ordering that a special election be held in this congressional district on Monday, June 1, for the purpose of electing a successor to the late Congressman Tongue. The sheriffs of the different counties will be duly notified and it becomes their duty to notify judges of election. The congressional central committee is to meet today, and nominating conventions must be held forty-five days before the election. The call for an election revives politi-

cal activity and fires the ambition and energy of the numerous candidates. In view of the many aspirants for the congressional shoes, there promises to be no lack of interest or life in the contest.

DISTRICT ATTORNEYSHIP

A Salem correspondent of the Oregonian reports that there is doubt as to the validity of the legislative act creating a prosecuting attorney district in Klamath and Lake counties and electing L. F. Conn to fill the office until 1904. The following extracts from an article published in Friday's Oregonian, explains the status of the case:

"Section 16 of article 5 of the constitution provides, among other things, that when a vacancy exists in any state office the appointment of which is not vested in the legislature, the vacancy shall be filled by the Governor. Under this section, it is claimed by some that Conn's election by the legislature would not be legal. On the other hand, since the legislature filled the office at the same time it was created, it might also be contended that no vacancy existed.

"The question as to the legality of the election would probably not be raised in court unless Mr. Conn should file a criminal information against some person without the case being investigated by a grand jury, and in that case it is very probable that a demurrer to the information would be filed, on the ground that the Prosecuting Attorney was without authority.

"The act creating the new Prosecuting Attorney districts provides that the term of office shall be four years."
