Call For Republican Convention.

Whereas, a writ of election has been issued by the state of Oregon, ordering a special election to be held on Monday, June 1st, A. D., 1903, in the First congressional district for the purpose of electing a representative in congress for said district, Now, therefore, a republican congressional convention is hereby called to meet at Klamath Falls, Klamath county, Oregon, on Saturday, the 4th day of April, 1903, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., at the court house in said town, for the purpose of electing four delegates to the congressional convention for the First congressional district of Oregon, to be held at Eugene, Oregon, on April 19th, 1903, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before said convention. The convention will be composed of 39 delegates, apportioned among the several precincts of the county as follows: Linkville, 10; Tule Lake, 5; Lost River, 3; Langgill Valley, 2; Sprague River, 2; Dairy, 4; Wood River, 4; Pleвна, 3; Snow, 3; Poe Valley, 2; and Klamath Lake, 1; the same being 1 delegate at large for each precinct, and 1 delegate for each 18 votes or fraction thereof over one-half cast for Hon. F. I. Dunbar, at the last state election, held in 1902.

Primaries will be held in the various precincts of the county, March 26th, 1903, at the usual voting places in said precincts, at the hour of 2 o'clock p. m. of said day.

FUNERAL OF MISS MCCRAW.

A sympathizing concourse of people attended the funeral services of the late Miss Ora McCraw, in the Presbyterian church, Friday afternoon, and the general expression of regret and sorrow over her death attested to the high esteem in which she was held. The attendance of Miss McCraw's pupils in a body was very impressive and showed the endearing ties which existed between them and their teacher, whose sudden removal had weighed their young hearts with sadness.

In response to a number of requests we publish a summary of the eulogy delivered at the funeral by Rev. W. Truman Eison, as follows:

"Another chapter is finished. A life work done, and if the title were written across the book as it is sent back to the Creator it could truthfully read, 'Purity, Love, Truthfulness.' A life of purity and love! A life lived for God and for man! Beloved! We have gathered to look for the last time upon the face of a daughter, niece, teacher and friend. The tender spirit, speaking in all feeling of security and faith, 'It is God's will,' has passed from this world of tears to the arms of her Creator, her God, the Redeemer, whom she loved so well in life, whom she obeyed, with whom she lived so closely. We mourn that she has been taken from us, but we do not forget that she was given. She did her work and lived a life pure and holy. Her each word and deed speak of purity and love. How little we thought she would so soon pass from us beyond the veil. But her faith in God was strong, and had she known her life was fast passing on toward the twilight of life, so ready was she to go that she would have said:

"Then steal away; give little warning 'Choose thine own time. 'Say not good night, but in some brighter clime. 'Bid me good morning.' "Her work was finished and as a tired child she went to sleep, resting in the arms of faith, safe in the arms of Jesus. We weep today, but, beloved, comfort one another, for remember Jesus wept with Mary and Martha over their brother, Lazarus. We mourn, but we know that she is with God and that her soul went back to Him untroubled and pure as

morning dew. We know, dear ones, that if the earthly house of this tabernacle be dissolved we have a building from God, a house not made by hands, eternal in the Heavens and that she is there—not dead, but with God, waiting the coming of loved ones and friends.

"It is most fitting that you, dear children, should be seated here close by her, you whom she loved, you whom she thought about and would be near. She recognized the good in each of you and strove to help you on and on. You were on her mind as she lay on her bed of sickness; your welfare was her heart's greatest desire. She knew and loved each one. I have thought during these sad days what it all meant: The earnest inquiries, the sad smiles, the tearful eyes of the boy and girl. What does this class of boys and girls sitting here in sadness mean? What do these falling tears mean? Simply this beloved—that the one thing the heart of humanity is hungering after is friendship, kindness, gentleness, love. These are priceless gifts, the most priceless of all the gifts we can give one another and these qualities were prominent in our beloved dead. Tenderness and love were her conquerors, kindness her motto. The rash and unruly loved her, obeyed her and honored her. The gentle loved and cherished her. What an example! Which one of you my dear boys and girls will not make your life more beautiful and pure for having had her for a teacher and a friend? The highest eulogy paid to any one in the Bible is the passage in which Moses is spoken of as a friend of God. Without irreverence I say she was a friend of that God. For years she has been serving her master; as a mere child she came a sacrifice to his service and she has lived a life worthy of a child of God. She went to her God a pure woman. Dead: oh, no. Friends, she is not dead; in the hearts of all who knew her, she lives, will live, a living fire which will lift upward and upward, and could she speak to us from her new home I feel it would be her favorite text, 'Create in me a clean heart, oh God.' Day by day this was her prayer, her one desire that her heart be made clean. Friends that mourn her, that miss her, take her prayer, let it be yours, for in God's mysterious future we shall meet again. We see it but dimly now; the sunlight seems dim from our great sorrow, but we will see it in the future. We stand beneath the shadow of the cross. We are all sad but with our faces turned toward God, with our hearts ready to offer to the Christ, we look above to her new dwelling place and feel that though she has crossed that stream some choose to call death, she waits there safe and secure in the arms of the Savior your coming, dear loved ones. Sadness seems our lot, but the joy upon the promised shore is great, for loved ones, gathered there, rejoice over the home coming of one who, tired of the world and its strife, laid herself down to sleep, saying peacefully, 'It is God's will.' Truly, with Paul she can say, 'I have run my race; I am ready to meet my God; I have fought a good fight.' Yes, the lessons left by her tender spirit, the kind deeds, the noble womanhood will remain forever as a blossoming flower to teach all who knew her a better way to live. 'Create in me a pure heart.'"

"We rejoice in the life which God gave and has again taken. We thank God for her example, her sweet lessons, her love and friendship. We come to pay our honor to her. How can we do it? By these flowers or words, these tears or suffering? No. You, my young friends, by living lives such as she would have you, pure and holy, living by her motto, 'Create in me a pure heart, oh God!' you, young ladies, by being as she, noble and womanly, pure and true; you, my boy friends, by having clean hearts and true and noble spirits; by living close to her God, by her ideal, her motto. All can then best honor her sweet memory.

"We know that but a step divides us and in order to meet again we must live as she; glad for this sweet life, glad that it was our privilege to know and love that noble woman. May not one who loved her here fail to meet her in all glory and happiness in the home not made by hands, where God rules and where peace and joy reign supreme, where sorrow and death and pain and tears never enter. May her life's work be as stepping stones for those she loved and when we meet with God we shall know as we are known."
