

LOCAL NEWS.

Tuesday was St. Patrick's day. After May 19 all death sentences in Oregon will be executed at the state penitentiary.

The stage from Ashland had a break-down last night and is late in arriving today.

A Mrs. Sargent, living in the east end of town, died this morning after a lingering illness.

Grants Pass has the promise of a gift of \$5,000 from Andrew Carnegie for a public library.

W. S. Worden is temporarily filling the vacancy in school, caused by the death of Miss McCraw.

A large cougar rent the air with its yells near the school house in Lakeview one night last week.

Overflowing rivers have swept many parts of the East with devastating floods during the past few weeks.

Four new papers, instead of two, as previously reported, are being landed at Silver Lake in Lake county.

Two S. P. trains collided early Saturday morning near Eugene, doing considerable damage, but injuring no one.

An enjoyable dance, attended by about twenty-five couples, was given in Houston's opera house in honor of St. Patrick's day, Tuesday night.

Agreeable to the wishes of his friends, Judge Baldwin has cast aside his mask of whiskers and his face now appears as smooth as a billiard ball.

O. T. Brown who sold his ranch to H. H. Van Valkenburg, expects to seek a location in the Rogue river valley as soon as the roads become more easily passable.

The state superintendent reports that since Arbor day comes on April 10 the eighth grade examinations will be held on April 7, 8 and 9 instead of April 8, 9 and 10.

Attorney E. D. Briggs of Ashland has instituted legal proceedings against that city to recover \$500 which he claims to be due him for legal services rendered during last year.

Voters are not required to register in order to participate in the special election to be held in June. The law provides for the registration of voters only for general elections once in two years.

Dr. E. Johnson and wife arrived here yesterday from a visit in the vicinity of Dairy and leaves tomorrow for his home in Arizona. He likes this country very much and expects to return here to locate.

Last Thursday night R. W. Marple was thrown from his stage by the rough road on the hill west of town and had his left leg considerably bruised. Lynn Yaden who was returning from San Jose, Cal., was also somewhat hurt.

Francis J. Bowne expects to begin work on his irrigating enterprise on land near Bonanza as soon as the roads will permit bringing in the necessary machinery. He will lift water from Lost river by means of a pumping plant.

The report that there is a case of smallpox at the Linkville Hotel is an absolute mistake. Drs. Stephenson and Hargus made a critical examination of the patient in question yesterday and found no indications or symptoms of smallpox.

The blooded horse owned by Ed. Martin and in charge of E. B. Ramsey is one of the best horses ever brought into Klamath county. For size, speed and other good qualities it is hard to beat. Its pedigree will be found elsewhere in this paper.

The garments of a man were found in a ravine near Ashland on Tuesday of last week and the fate of the owner is wrapped in mystery. The name found on papers with the clothes is Chas. H. McCartney, but all other marks of identification had been destroyed.

On Monday R. I. Hamond began clearing the debris from his burnt block, preparatory to rebuilding for occupancy as soon as possible the apartment formerly used for a post-office. Later on he expects to rebuild the entire block on a bigger and better scale than it was before the fire.

News has reached here that Rev. Jesse Kirk, who went to Washington some months ago in the interest of the treaty with the Klamath Indians, is now sick in that city with appendicitis. He had a successful surgical operation performed and it is reported he is on the road to recovery.

People in Oregon will pay taxes twice next year according to the new law passed by the legislature. They will pay the taxes levied this year and those levied next year. It thus makes a double dose for 1904, but will make no difference in the long run. The intention is to require payment of such indebtedness in the fall instead of spring.

We are reliably informed that T. I. Potter, a Michigan capitalist who

owns 5,000 acres of timber near the Klamath river, will soon begin the erection of a sawmill on his tract. The mill will have a capacity of 20,000 feet per year. We understand that other mills will also be put up in that vicinity during the coming summer.

Lakeview Examiner: Major L. T. Barin, one of Oregon's old republican war horses, arrived here from Portland last week, and has been looking up some timber land before the land office. The Major passed through here in 1862, before there was any town. He served nine years as register of the Oregon City land office, and was at one time U. S. marshal for Oregon.

Capt. O. C. Applegate informs us that it is the purpose to commence work on the Modoc Point ditch early in April with a hundred men or more, in the hope of completing that desirable work in time for use next year. This ditch, when completed, will make available for field and garden culture the Modoc Point country, the most favored portion of the reservation for such purposes, as it is a rich alluvial body of land and more free from frost than any other portion of the reservation.

The republican congressional committee met at Portland last Thursday and decided to hold a convention at Eugene on April 4 to nominate a candidate to succeed the late Hon. Thos. H. Tongue. The appointment of delegates is one for every 150 votes cast, as shown by the last congressional vote, and one for every fraction of 150 over one-half, with a delegate at large in every county. This arrangement gives Klamath county 14 delegates and the total number in the convention will be 173.

Ashland Record: Mason, Lindley & Co., have been sending logs from their dam at Klamath on Klamath river, to the Durney mill at Igerna by rail, for cutting into lumber. These logs were accumulated prior to the burning down of the big mill, box and house furnishing factories last fall, from the timber sections near the Oregon boundary, by floating them down the river. A large number of logs were carried down the river by breakage of a portion of the dam, but many of them have been recovered to be forwarded to the saw mill.

With the favorable weather this week the survey for the proposed irrigating canal has been progressing rapidly and the feasibility of the enterprise increases as the work advances. It is found, to the surprise of all, that the proposed ditch will be seventeen feet higher than the old one now in use and will thus irrigate thousands of acres more than had been figured on. Even the Pine Grove country and Poe Valley can be watered by it. Thus greatly extending the area to be benefited by the ditch, its value to the county is enhanced beyond all former expectations.

Last Saturday H. L. Boggs met with a distressing accident which will keep him from work for a couple of weeks at least. He had the index finger of his right hand torn off at the first joint by a machine with which he was making grooves for shelving. The two blades of the machine were making 600 revolutions a minute when the table on which he was working suddenly dropped, throwing his hand under one of the sharp-edged instruments, with the result as mentioned above. The finger was hanging only by the skin, but Mr. Boggs quickly re-adjusted it and hurried to the office of Dr. Hargus who sewed the flesh around the finger and dressed it. It is hoped to save the afflicted member, though it would be an exceptional accomplishment.

The newly wedded couple are highly respected young people and have many friends who wish them a happy and prosperous journey through life.
