SHEEP VS. CATTLE.
 (Contributed.)
 Among cattle owners there is an erroneous impression that the statutes of Idaho contain a provision that makes it unlawful to herd sheep or stock of any kind within two miles of a residence or habitation.
 Prior to 1890 under the territorial statute such a law was enacted, but the courts declared the act unconstitutional for the reason that no state or territory possessed the right to legislate the use or control of government land, for grazing purposes within its boundaries.
 Since the admission of Idaho as a state there has been no such law in

that state or any other. A bill to enact a similar law was attempted in the last legislature of Oregon, but died in the committee.
 A law to impose a tax by license or otherwise upon stock migrating from one county to another for grazing or other purposes would be unconstitutional. The Oregon constitution says all taxation shall be equal and uniform (Art. IX, Sec. 1). If stock pays a tax in one county and afterwards during the same year is transferred to another county and there taxed by license or otherwise for grazing or other purposes it would be double taxation, consequently not "equal and uniform."
 Equity demands that on stock grazing in each of two counties a part of each year, the taxes should be proportionately divided.
 An act dividing the taxes on any class of property between the two counties affected would certainly meet the requirements of the constitution and be sustained by the courts.
 The leasing of the public lands by the United States by a law carefully drawn with actual settlers' interests rigidly guarded is the most reasonable solution of the range controversy between sheep and cattle interests.

DRIVING LOOSE STOCK ACROSS THE FOREST RESERVE.
Persons are Required to Have a Permit.
 The following rules were issued by the Department of the Interior July 15, 1902:
 Persons wishing to cross any part of a forest reserve over a public road or trail, established sheep or cattle trail, or the ordinary mountain trail with a band of sheep or herd of cattle or horses, (the few head of stock following a wagon or pack train being excepted from this regulation,) must make application to the forest supervisor in charge, either by letter or on the regular application form, for the privilege of grazing the stock on the reserve en route, and must have a permit from the supervisor, to be issued by him on the form in use by him for issuing grazing permits. The application must state the number of stock to be driven across the reserve, the date of starting, and period required for the passage. Grazing on the reserve along any such road or trail will only be allowed for the period actually necessary for the stock to make passage across the reserve.

Call For Republican Convention.
 Whereas, a writ of election has been issued by the state of Oregon, ordering a special election to be held on Monday, June 1st, A. D., 1903, in the First congressional district for the purpose of electing a representative in congress for said district.
 Now, therefore, a republican congressional convention is hereby called to meet at Klamath Falls, Klamath county, Oregon, on Saturday, the 4th day of April, 1903, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., at the court house in said town, for the purpose of electing four delegates to the congressional convention for the First congressional district of Oregon, to be held at Eugene, Oregon, on April 9th, 1903, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before said convention. The convention will be composed of 39 delegates, apportioned among the several precincts of the county as follows: Linkville, 10; Tule Lake, 5; Lost River, 3; Langell Valley, 2; Sprague River, 3; Dairy, 4; Wood River, 4; Plewma, 3; Snow, 3; Poe Valley, 2; and Klamath Lake, 1; the same being 1 delegate at large for each precinct, and 1 delegate for each 18 votes or fraction thereof over one-half cast for Hon. F. I. Dunbar, at the last state election, held in 1902.
 Primaries will be held in the various precincts of the county, March 26th, 1903, at the usual voting places in said precincts, at the hour of 2 o'clock p. m. of said day.
