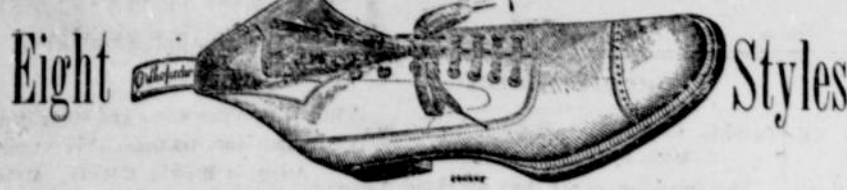

The suit brought against the Northern Securities Company—the Northern Pacific and Great Northern Railways—by the government has been decided by the United States circuit court of appeals. It is a victory against the trusts. The case will be appealed to the United States supreme court which will in due time hand down a final decision.

In nominating Hon. Binger Hermann, the republican congressional convention selected a man who can accomplish things for his district and state when he gets to Washington. He already has the necessary acquaintance and experience with public affairs. He thus possesses what a new man would have to acquire before doing any effective work.

By discreet direction, talking may be made a healthy and harmless exercise. It is as helpful to the vocal organs as frequent driving is to the limbs of a race horse. By sifting in an idea occasionally and checking the jaws when the head is empty, listeners are not apt to experience nervous prostration, even without a tonic, and thus vocal development may be had with no serious injury to one's audience. However, with unwise engineering and particularly with nothing to say, it would be more humane to let the voice get most of its exercise in some other way. Relief and benefit may be had in joining a singing school or by cultivating the habit of long and loud prayers—in privacy of course. Hiccoughs or sneezing, either of which may be easily produced, are probably about as good exercise for the throat as talking.

We understand that the legislature at its session unanimously adopted a memorial asking congress to amend the Indian war pension act which passed congress at its last session, so as to include in its benefits the veterans of the Modoc war. The memorial was introduced by Hon. J. M. Shelley of Lane county. As the measure now stands, it extends the period of service for which pensions can be granted to 1857. The state volunteers rendered arduous and dangerous service in the Modoc war and it is eminently fair to include them, and we hope our senators and representatives will make an earnest effort, as we are confident they will do, to secure the amendment which the legislature generously asks. We are informed that Captain Applegate suggested this legislation and prepared the memorial and that he intends to soon organize a camp of Indian war veterans at Klamath Falls.

BINGER HERMANN NOMINATED.

At the convention held in Eugene last Thursday, Hon. Binger Hermann of Roseburg was nominated for congress to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. Thos. H. Tongue. The nomination was made on the 24th ballot and after a long struggle in which eight candidates, including the successful one, figured as rivals. Eighty-seven votes were necessary to secure a nomination and early in the proceedings Hermann reached within six or seven votes of the required number. At one time, however, he gave up hope of victory and left the convention for the hotel. Later it was seen that the strength of other candidates was divided with little prospect of concentration, and then Hermann supporters renewed their efforts and finally gathered enough votes to win.

Mr. Hermann is regarded one of the ablest men in the state and will return to congress with the advantage of many years of successful experience in public affairs. He is very popular with people in Klamath county where he will roll up a big vote.

A. E. REAMES THE DEMOCRATIC NOMINEE.

A. E. Reames of Jacksonville was nominated for congress by the democratic convention at Albany on Saturday. Only one vote was taken, the result being 67 votes for Reames and 32 votes for John A. Jeffrey of Marion county. Mr. Reames is now serving as district attorney.

IRRIGATION.

Tap our huge, natural reservoir and spread its waters over the great Klamath Basin, as is now proposed by the Merrill Mutual Canal Co., and this county can soon show the largest, most feasible and profitable working of irrigation to be found in the world. It will many times multiply the quantity of alfalfa grown, and that is the most valuable crop that can be cultivated anywhere. Under irrigation, lands here produce fully double the number of bushels per acre of wheat, oats, rye and barley that can be raised in what are termed the grain growing sections of the East. We have plenty of fertile soil and an abundance of water and the essential of getting them together and increasing productive-ness will be accomplished at an early date if indications count for anything.

As to points to consider in the matter of irrigation, we gather the following from persons thoroughly familiar with the subject:
"There is only one safe way to procure water for irrigable lands and that is to buy it after it is bought to the land. That can only be done by contracting to take it at a stipulated price in advance. Water rights should be perpetual and made a part of the appurtenances of and inseparable from the land. If they were owned separately either would be of uncertain and little value. Water rights and lands will constantly increase in value as the country increases in settlement. All contracts for irrigation must be exactly the same to each individual from the company supplying the water, to make them valid.

The important question to a party buying a water right is this: "Is it a profitable investment?" In selling water rights the object of most construction companies is to extend to land owners a long period of years of credit at a very low rate of interest, so that the amount can be paid easily without being materially felt by those contracting for the same. This is an equitable method. As the land is sold to others, they may bear their proportion of the debt. This plan is most plainly demonstrated in state, county and municipal debts that mature slowly in long periods of time and are scarcely felt by anybody. This is the modern way of developing the country and is the method used in all large enterprises and especially in railroad building, canal building, government enterprises, etc.

Again comes the question of confidence to discern that which is best, and strive for that regardless of opposition. In other words, it is the confidence that enables a man to take chances, without which great things can never be accomplished."
