Wilson & Heidrich, the wholesale liquor dealers, have just bought of S. T. Summers an elegant well matched team of sorrels, weight about 1350. They propose hauling their own freight during the summer and also to make delivery to their customers in the surrounding towns.

County Clerk Jas. H. Driscoll made a trip to Bonanza Sunday in the interest of the newly organized "Driscoll Mercantile Co." of that place. He reports that they have received several freight teams of new goods during the past week and are now all ready for business.

The Alturas Plaindealer says: Mr. Yates, after canvassing the business houses of Alturas, failed to receive sufficient encouragement for putting in water works, and the project, for the present at least, has been abandoned. It is only a matter of time, however, when water works will be established.

Our merchants are getting ready for the big trade that is expected during the summer. Freight wagons are arriving in the city every day. On Monday, Robt. E. Hunsaker, E. E. McCarthy and L. Biehn brought in a wagon train each of freight. Business is picking up and things are looking rather lively around town.

Major Worden has just bought a 42 foot front on Main Street next to Baldwin's hardware store. He proposes building a two story modern office building. No excavations will be made as the building will set considerable above the level of the street and will have a solid stone street front and an approach of wide stone steps. The offices will be arranged in suits of two rooms each.

J. A. McIntire of the Ashland-Klamath Falls stage line arrived in town Monday morning. When asked in regard to the proposed change in mail route, he stated that he thought in all probability, the government would make the change, thereby having the mail come by railroad to Polegama and have the stage carry it from there instead of from Ashland. This would cut off about half of the route but he would still retain his contract for this end.

Medford Mail: An enterprise of more than usual magnitude has been launched this week in the incorporation of the Three Pines Timber Company, whose principal office is in Medford. The incorporators consist of A. E. Reamens, W. I. Vawter, G. E. Howland and J. D. Cook. At a meeting of the directors held this week, Mr. Reamens was elected president and Mr. Vawter, secretary. The object of the incorporation is the manufacture of lumber, etc., and the company has extensive holdings in Jackson and Josephine counties which they intend developing. Sufficient capital for the proper carrying out of the corporations plans is practically assured, and there is no doubt that in the capable and experienced hands of the gentlemen above named that the enterprise will not only be beneficial to the parties directly involved, but to the community at large in the way of development of the resources of the county and an increase in desirable immigration.

The Oregonian of the 24th has in substance the following, on request of Secretary Hitchcock. The Department of Justice has instructed the U. S. Attorney at Portland to take steps looking to the arrest of Marie Ware, late United States Commissioner at Eugene, Or., and also the arrest of two other Oregon Commissioners, whose names cannot be learned. Miss Ware and the other two Commissioners are to be arraigned for perjury, falsification of records and conspiracy, with additional minor charges against each. Miss Ware has left Eugene and her whereabouts are not known, and it is feared she has gotten out of the country. If so, and she can be located, extradition proceedings will be instituted to procure her return.

The Lakeview papers report big preparations being made for ball games and races on the Fourth. They now have a baseball fund of \$400. The purses are to be divided, \$250 going to the best team and \$150 to the second best. There must be at least three teams compete. No entrance fee will be charged and no teams barred from entering. Now is the time for Klamath Falls to do something. We have a first class team here with good material and there is no reason why we could not carry off the championship of Southern Oregon. If we play Lakeview on the Fourth, we can get a return game for the Fall races here.

Roy Howard, son of the Lake county stockman, J. W. Howard, says the Silver Lake Bulletin, won first honors and a gold medal at the local contest at the Corvallis Agricultural College prohibition association, and will represent that institution in a state contest to be held at Dallas May 1st.

The first trip of the new Railroad from Laird to Polegama will be made on May 1st. In the future we need not dread the long and tedious trip over the mountains as it will be only a four or five hour ride to connect with the railroad.

Ross Boyd, who has been attending a dental college in Portland, will leave there May 2nd, and after a short visit in Yreka will return home to spend the summer with his parents Dr. and Mrs. E. J. Boyd.

George Biehn of the Klamath Stables is erecting a new residence on Main street next to the hotel. It is well under way now and when completed will make a neat and attractive addition to our town.

Henry Parrish came in Tuesday from Ashland with a big load of timber people. The rush of people in here is more than overtaxing the accommodations of our hotels.

EVERY ONE TO PAY TAXES.

The new law passed by the last legislature, to amend Sec. 3039 of Bellingier and Cotton's annotated Codes and Statutes of Oregon, eliminates the following sections relating to tax exemptions:

The personal property of all persons, who by reason of infirmity, age or poverty, may in the opinion of the assessor, be unable to contribute toward the public charges.

The public property of every household to the amount of \$300, the articles to be selected by the household shall be exempt. If this law is enforced—and we suppose it will be—it will mean that all private property, either personal or real, will be taxed. That includes everything, the clothes a man wears, furniture in his house, books, pictures, in fact nothing is omitted. The only persons whose names will not appear on the tax roll are paupers and Indians and perhaps minors.
