### DEMOCRAT FOR HERMANN.

### Too Much Talk About Land Affairs May Prove a Boomerang.

PORTLAND, April 30.—As a Democrat I would prefer to see elected to Congress a Democratic representative from the First District, but I wish to warn the Democrats of that district that if they depend upon the defeat of Binger Hermann because of his record as Commissioner of the General Land Office, they will find it in the nature of a boomerang—of course not against the Democratic nominee. As an old man I have carefully watched the differences between Secretary Hitchcock and Commissioner Hermann, and I am yet to find, other than mere allegations, anything reflecting upon Mr. Hermann's honor, integrity or ability as head of the Land Service of the Government.

It has been exploited in the newspapers that people from the east have been allowed to take up land under the timber and stone act. If anyone will read the timber and stone act he will find that no citizen is excluded from taking up and paying for lands under that act; no more than if a citizen of Oregon should go to Maine and buy goods from the shelf. The timber and stone act has been open to abuse, but abuse that the commissioner is powerless to prevent. The law is plain, and it amounts to an advertisement that the timber and stone lands of the government are for sale. The alleged frauds of United States Commissioners in connection with the executive duties of the Commissioner of the General Land Office. I am conversant with many of Mr. Hermann's rulings as commissioner, and am yet to find one that was not based upon a clear knowledge of the law and common sense.

I am an Oregonian, and cannot forget that Mr. Hermann as a member of the committee on rivers and harbors did valiant service for the state. Mr. Hitchcock is a polished gentleman. The difference between him and Mr. Hermann indicate to my mind a desire to pose as a reformer. They are both Republicans, and as a Democrat I would like to see the fight go on, but the services of Commissioner Hermann, I think, are equal if not superior to those of Mr. Hitchcock. I am speaking simply in the interest of Oregon.—Oregonian.

### WILL NOT CLOSE THE DOOR.

### Russia Gives Assurances That American Commerce Is Safe.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—The State Department has received a dispatch from Ambassador McCormick, at St. Petersburg, to the effect that the Russian Minister of Foreign Affairs has assured him that the published reports of the proposed convention between Russia and China relating to Manchuria are absolutely incorrect, and that there is no foundation for the report that Russia demands that China shall refuse the requests of other powers for treaty ports and Consulates in Manchuria. He has been assured that the Russian Government has no intention to exclude other countries from advantages now enjoyed in Manchuria, or to confer exclusive privileges upon Russia; that the United States may be sure that nothing will be done to close doors now open, and that American capital are those which Russia most desires to attract. It is understood also that similar assurances were received by the Secretary of State from His Excellency, the Russian Ambassador, yesterday afternoon.

Sir Michael Herbert, the British Ambassador, called on Secretary Hay today, and was acquainted with the nature of the report made by Mr. McCormick, and it is presumed that he had similar advices from his own government. Baron von Sternberg, the German Minister, in company with Baron Scheller, the new second secretary of the German Embassy, also called at the State Department, and he likewise was advised of the latest development in the case. These advices have done much to remove the feeling of anxiety and apprehension which was aroused in Washington by the first reports from Pekin of Russia's intention to dominate Manchuria.

The officials are glad to take the Russian disclaimer just as it comes, without stopping to raise any point as to whether there has not really been a change in the Russian demands, rather than an error in the original statement from Pekin.

There is no disposition to be hypercritical, but the fact that nothing is said about Russian evacuation, according to the original treaty, will, of course, justify our government in keeping a close watch on North China Mongolia, as well as Manchuria.

ASHLAND, Or., May 2.—Arthur Carter, son of Major Carter, bruised himself up quite seriously during a nightmare Tuesday night at the family home down Helman street. He imagined he was after a fly ball and jumped from a window, taking everything along with him, then continuing his somnambulist race through the blackberry patch at the end of which he nabbed the imaginary baseball. His brother Clyde, who sleeps with him, was aroused and brought Arthur to the house and put him back in bed.

Arthur Carter has been practicing for two weeks with the local team preparing for the season's games. He is a new product in the baseball world and when Captain Billy Hulien took charge of the Ashland club last season and star players were imported Carter proved himself a star of the local product and was retained, proving a match for the professional players and has a career before him.

### TOWN BOARD MEETS.

The regular monthly meeting of the town board was held on Monday evening at the City hall with President Shive in the chair and Recorder Schallcock, Constable Humphrey and Trustees Beal, Ward, Campbell and Henry present. A number of bills were allowed and ordered paid. A communication was read in regard to the proposed electric call bells to be placed in the houses of members of the fire department. Further information was necessary so nothing definite was decided upon. The subject of the suit against the Klamath Falls Irrigating Co. was brought up and thoroughly discussed. The suit was commenced by the old board and the new members were not conversant with the details and so reference was made to the records for information.

A motion was passed authorizing the President to appoint a health officer for the town. Mr. Shive then said he would appoint Dr. H. B. Hargus, he being the county physician, it would simplify matters to have one man to attend all cases for both the county and town.

Quite a discussion then ensued with reference to the streets and sewerage. The matter was left with the street committee with power to purchase the necessary terra cotta sewer pipes for those places on Main street that are in need of new sewer crossings. The following committees were appointed: street—Ward and Beal; fire and sanitary—Campbell and Henry. The meeting then adjourned.
