

There appeared not to be a dissenting vioce and Mr. Tom Martin about expressed the sentiment of the land owners present when called upon for a speech. He said: "Ladies and gentlemen, I havn't anything to say with the exception that I am ready to sign for my land just as soon as they will let me." The meeting then adjourned and immediately afterward they began the signing of the contracts. This contract shall be binding upon the land owner until Sep-

tember 1st, 1903, in order to enable Mr. Brong to ascertain whether a sufficient number of contracts can be obtained to make the construction of the canal feasible. The changes in the new contract are as follows:

The corporation to be formed by F. Brong and his associates shall be known as the MERRILL IRRIGATION AND IMPROVEMENR COMPANY. For the first year after the completion of said canal and laterals, nothing shall be paid for such maintenance. For the second and third years, there shall be paid in advance on the first Monday in April of each year, to the said first party, the sum of fifty cents per acre for all of said lands found to be irrigable.
