WANTS REAMES TO APOLOGIZE.

Prudence dictates in all well regulated families, that when there is dirt lined to be washed, it should be cleansed within their own household. We believe that this rule holds good in political parties as well as in individual families. While we are aware that the rule is not always strictly adhered to in either case, we never-the-less believe that it would be for the best interest of the family or political party as the case may be if it were observed.

Just now, we are sorry to say, there seems to be a public washing going on between the great majority of the democratic party in this county on one side and A. E. Reames, congressional candidate for that party in this district, on the other. The Herald regrets very much that a circular letter bearing the signature of A. E. Reames is being generally sent throughout this county, informing the people that parties claiming to be Democrats, and especially naming Dr. Daly, were not supporting him for Congress. What authority Mr. Reames has for promulgating such a report we do not know, or what influence has been brought to bear to goad him into making such an unwarranted statement at this time is beyond our comprehension. So far as we know Dr. Daly and all other Democrats of Lake County have been supporting Mr. Reames all through the present campaign.

We feel that it is not only unjust, but it is a positive insult to the intelligence and loyalty of the Democrats of Lake County. We feel that a full explanation and an apology is due the Democrats of this part of the District from Mr. Reames. We believe that Mr. Reames has been imposed upon; that he has taken reports for facts without having first made a full and careful investigation and has acted illadvisedly on the same. We hope that Mr. Reames will be able to make a satisfactory explanation of his unwarranted criticism of the Democrats of Lake County, and in the mean time we ask our friends to suspend their judgement until the matter is more fully understood--Lakeview Herald.

HERMANN'S RECORD.

EDITOR REPUBLICAN: Since the so-called Democratic press of this state and as much of it elsewhere as the Reames management could purchase, have shouted themselves hoarse about Hon. Binger Hermann's record in the land office, it may not be amiss to say a word on that subject, not as an explanation or in defense, but by way of illustration. One of the peculiar features of this unwarranted attack to which I desire to call the special attention of the voter is the cowardly manner in which these alleged politicians get up on the stump and yell BRAVD without specifying or attempting to point to a single questionable transaction. A certain Jas. Scheid, who assumes the prefix of "Rev," makes a great deal of noise and beats the air with the fool statement that "Binger Hermann has lost to Oregon millions of dollars' worth of timber and lands through willful neglect of his duties." I respectfully ask this worthy Rev. how this can possibly be. Oregon has lost none of her territory, her boundaries remain unchanged. None of her forests have been digged up or carried away. She still exercises EMINENT DOMAIN over all lands within her boundaries, then where the loss? Within the past 3 years in some portions of the state considerable areas have been added to the tax bearing account of the state thereby materially increasing her source of revenue. The government title has become devolved and is now held by the citizen. But the lands are still in existence, likewise the timber, then in all candor where is the loss? I say without hesitation or fear of successful contradiction that this species of mud slinging is not intended for or directed to the intelligent thinking voter, but especially designed to catch the ear of the unwary, and to all such I wish to say Mr. Hermann's record proves him to be and to have ever been the true friend of the mass, this is apparent during his entire official term as Land Commissioner, his recommendation adverse to the proposed "Range Leasing" bill, his "Checker Boarding" of forest reserves so as to exclude therefrom railroad grant lands across the same, and last but not least, his recommendation for repeal of the lieu land act, these last two being directly in the interest of the people by the increased area of public domain subject to settlement under the homestead laws and general distribution among the people under the other land laws of the United States,

especially the Timber and Stone act. It seems more than probable, in view of the recent wholesale withdrawals of vast areas as pretended forest reserves, that the avowed policy of Mr. Hermann to preserve the public lands for general distribution among the people, was the real cause of disagreement between him and his superior, the Honorable Secretary.

Oregon has developed slowly. She has within her border considerable areas of good timber lands, unfit for settlement or cultivation, vast water power unemployed and unappropriated. With these resources readily available some of her citizens in the more remote and sparsely settled portions have hoped for and confidently looked forward to the development of important lumbering industries, necessitating the building of railroads and providing transportation facilities to her interior and employment of labor both in the forest and farm. Mr. Hermann's policy as shown by his record favored a consummation of these developments and facilitated the peopling of our whole state. Does the recent acts of the Secretary of the Interior in setting apart so-called forest reserves tend to such development? You the sovereign people please answer this at the polls June 1st. Say then by your vote whether you approve the withdrawal of one-half of Josephine County the greater portion of Curry and Coos Counties and last, practically every acre of public timber land in Lake County, all of which may subsequently be acquired by corporations and monopolists. RAILROAD PROSPECTS.

An important conference was held lately in San Francisco between President Harriman of the S. P. line and officials of northern railroads in regard to railroad matters. Harriman recently purchased the California North Western railroad, which runs through Marin, Sonoma and Mendocino counties, at a cost of \$2,000,000, and it is believed that it will be extended farther north to Eureka, and finally up Klamath river, to form a junction with the Columbia Southern railroad, a southern branch of the Oregon Railway and Navigation line.

The Oregon Railway and Navigation Co., with line along the Columbia river to Spokane, Walla Walla and Eastern Oregon, is said to have recently merged its interests with the Oregon Short Line, which has passed under the control of the Union Pacific one of Harriman's lines. In the event of a junction of the southern extension of the O. R. & N. line, forming connection through Siskiyou county with the California North Western in Humboldt county, there would be another transcontinental line from Chicago, via Omaha, Cheyenne, Ogden, Eastern Oregon, Klamath Lake Basin and Klamath river to Eureka in reaching the California Great Western for San Francisco, via Ukiah, Santa Rosa, San Rafael and Tiburon, with ferry connection at latter point. The object of this move is evidently to head off Hill of the Great Northern building a road to San Francisco, who might eventually join with the Santa Fe R. Co., an agent of which recently purchased local short roads in Humboldt county, with intention of purchasing the California North Western, if Harriman had not come in ahead to pay the full price asked. The S. P. Co. now has a road of their own from San Francisco to the Mississippi river, by the southern route via Los Angeles and El Paso to New Orleans, and by the Central route, via Ogden and Cheyenne to Omaha. With this northern connection it will have a road from San Francisco via the Oregon Short Line, connecting at Portland and other northern points. The S. P. Co. will control all these lines, and is also reported as endeavoring to secure that portion of the Northern Pacific road from Portland to Tacoma and Seattle. Possibly the road built in this county from Laird's to Klamath lake may also become a part of this northern through road to the east.--Yreka Journal.

BIG FIRE AT ASHLAND.

Ashland suffered a most disastrous fire, this morning, which broke out shortly before 3 o'clock in the restaurant on Fourth street near the S. P. depot, and before its fiercest work was stopped nearly a whole block of business buildings went up in smoke and entailed a loss of nearly \$25,000, upon which there was an insurance of \$10,000 carried. The fire first swept up the street southward, licking up the wooden buildings in its path and damaging the one-story veneered brick building of C. E. Ninger, and only stopped at the solid brick walls of the building at corner Fourth and B streets. Next below where the fire broke out on the north was the Gurnea brick block and through the upper story windows of that structure which were unprotected by iron shutters the lurid elements shot, while the roof which was of shingles covered with a tar preparation, also quickly took fire and in the end there was little left of the building but the walls and the charred ruins of partitions and floors. The second story was fitted up as a lodging house and every one of the 21 rooms were occupied and beds had been made in the corridors and hallways.
