The United States Agricultural department is about to demonstrate that 3000 acres of alkali soil in Yakima County, Wash., can be reclaimed and made valuable agricultural land. The experiment will be made on 20 acres of land at first. The plan is very simple, a series of earthen drainage pipes will be laid throughout the tract and the land will then be flooded from the irrigation ditch, thereby washing the alkali from the soil.
