Of the Klamath County Agricultural Association, June 4 and 5, 1903—\$525 in purses.

THURSDAY, JUNE 4.

1. Half mile dash, free for all two year olds; purse \$75.

2. Half mile and repeat, free for all; purse \$75.

3. Vaquero race—Half mile dash, free for all Klamath county saddle horses, that have never run for public money. Weight to be not less than 175 pounds and Spanish saddles only to be used; purse \$25.

4. 1/4 mile and repeat, free for all; purse \$75.

FRIDAY, JUNE 5.

1. 1/4 mile and repeat, free for all; purse \$75.

2. 1/4 mile dash, free for all; purse \$75.

3. 1/4 mile pony race, free for all ponies not over 14 1/2 hands high; purse \$25.

4. Novelty race—mile dash, free for all; purse \$100 to be paid as follows: \$25 to leading horse at each quarter and no second money.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Purses—70 per cent to first horse; 30 per cent to second horse.

Entrance fee 10 per cent of purse in all races. Four to enter and three to start or no race.

Entries in above races must be made with the secretary on or before 7 o'clock p. m. the day before the race for which the entry is made.

Entries must be made in writing and give name, age and record of horse entered, and name of owner and jockey.

There must be not less than four bona fide entries and three to start.

NO CONTAGIOUS DISEASES

Klamath county is now free from all contagious diseases, according to the certificate issued Wednesday by County Health Physician Hargus. So let everyone attend the races at Klamath Falls June 4, 5 and 6.

Proof was sent to Major Applegate yesterday showing the sanitary condition of the county and asking that he give the Indians who wished permission to attend the races. There are a number of first class horses on the reservation, and the owners are desirous of entering them for the races, and besides the Indians play good ball and their game with the Falls' team promises to be interesting.

PURSES FOR BALL GAMES.

The Directors of the Klamath County Agricultural Association met at the court house Saturday afternoon and transacted the following business: Admissions to the ball games in the morning June 4 and 5 was set at 25 cents for grounds and grand stand. In the afternoon June 4, 5 and 6 was placed at 50 cents with additional charge to men to grand stand of 25 cents.

Agreed that 75 per cent of gate receipts in morning June 4 and 5 shall go to constitute the purses for those days—one-half of purse each day to go to winner and one-half to losing nine. Purse for ball game in afternoon June 6 is set at \$50, all of same to be paid to winning nine.

The winning nines in games June 4 and 5 will play the game on June 6.

Agreed that on the afternoon of June 6, besides the ball game that some extra races will be put on, as many as necessary to fill up the afternoon, and purses for same shall be arranged during race week, when it is definitely decided what races will be scheduled.

Adjournment was then taken sine die.

THE KLAMATH LAKE RAILROAD.

Very few people realize the extent of the magnificent scenery along the Klamath Lake Railroad. The new road which runs from Laird, Cal., on the Southern Pacific to Pokegama, Or., is one continuous panorama of scenery, the grandeur of which cannot be surpassed and is seldom equaled. The road winds along the beautiful Klamath river and on every side is seen beauties, the nature of which equals the finest river portions of the Canadian Pacific. When one reaches the big trestle, where Fall river gushes down the side of the mountain, the view is so fascinating that the traveler is held spell bound, and is reluctant to leave this magnificent sight, which is grander even than the famous Minnehaha Falls in Minnesota. But as the train rushes onward one's attention is held by the new and startling scenery that is continually opening up, until finally you enter the vast pine forests of Klamath county and arrive at Pokegama, the present terminus of the road.

Any one who has not had an opportunity to make the trip can gain a fair idea of the wonderful scenery in store for the traveler over this road, from the views which were taken this summer and are now being shown at Baldwin's Studio.

Pokegama, or the village of tents, is practically constructed of canvas. The apartments are walled up about five feet high and the tents nailed close to the wall all around. They all have good floors, good beds with plenty of bedding and a stove in each tent. There is ample accommodation for at least forty people over night and excellent meals for any number.

Stages are run daily both ways between the terminus and Klamath Falls, those leaving here at about 8.30 o'clock in the morning, arrive at Pokegama at 4 in the afternoon, with a rest of an hour or more at Chase's station for dinner.

It is to the interest of every progressive person in the county to patronize this road, make its tonnage large and thus enable the owners to continue it to Spencer creek, Keno and Klamath Falls, for individuals do not build railroads far, and to make long lines, requires a bonding of a system. Traffic is the thing that enables bonding of roads for extension, and if we expect to get the road here we should give the railroad now the benefit of all our traffic.

They have plenty of teams which they are ready to send out and agree to insure transportation of all freight.

Ladies will be admitted free to ball games from now until June 1st. A cordial invitation is extended to them
